7:30 p.m. 1 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Let's start the Concord Township 2 Board of Trustees' April 5, 2017, meeting to order. Please 3 stand for the Pledge of Allegiance. 4 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.) 5 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: I want to be consistent about 6 7 light. I like light windows. I like lights. 8 MR. GALLOWAY: Me, too. I like light but I think it 9 might mess --10 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: A big fan, big fan. MR. GALLOWAY: -- with the programming. 11 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Okay. Roll call. 12 13 MS. DAWSON: Mr. Malchesky? CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Present. 14 MS. DAWSON: Mrs. Luhta? 15 MS. LUHTA: Here. 16 17 MS. DAWSON: Mr. Galloway? MR. GALLOWAY: I am here. 18 19 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Okay. We have, our first thing, we have the Fire Department's recognition of Beth Lose 20 21 (pronounced "Louse") or Lose (pronounced "Loose")? 22 MS. DAWSON: Lose (pronounced "Low-s"). 23 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Lose, oh, see, three times is a 24 Well, we heard all about you, so why don't we read it, Connie. 25 26 MS. LUHTA: Okay, I will read it. "The Concord 27 Township Board of Trustees desires to honor and recognize the 28 heroic efforts of Beth Lose displayed on Saturday, February 25, 2017, that prevented additional injury to life and property. 29 Ms. Lose, you acted selflessly and quickly as you came upon a 30

vehicle with severe damage on Girdled Road that was occupied by an adult driver and two young children. Without hesitation, you put your own safety in jeopardy to remove children from a vehicle and provide them with warmth and comfort while waiting for the response from the Concord Township Fire Department. At the very least, your actions were directly responsible for the fact that the children were kept from any additional harm by your decisive action.

"The Trustees of Concord Township hereby endorse this Letter of Recognition as a tribute to Beth Lose for your heroic actions and exemplary display of community spirit." And we are all going to sign that. I did. Sign the copy, too. That's just a copy.

MR. GALLOWAY: Fantastic.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Do you want come on up here? Thank you and congratulations.

MS. LOSE: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Do you want to say something? You don't have to.

Chief, do you want to make any comments? MR. GALLOWAY: The floor is yours.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Yeah.

CHIEF SABO: So I, too, want to thank you personally for your efforts on that, on that traffic crash. As I approached the scene, my heart sunk seeing the vehicle upside. Well, it was upside down. It was upright by the time we got there. And to see that you had pulled those two kids out of the vehicle and brought them to safety, that was -- your decisive action certainly, as the Trustees noted in their letter, had a dramatic impact on the safety of the children

going forward until we got there.

So people generally don't like a lot of recognition for doing stuff like this but I think it's important that people that go above and beyond be recognized. So we certainly thank you. And the crew that showed up to relieve you are right behind you, too. So we certainly thank you again, so thanks.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Thank you very much. If you ever want to say something, just come on up here and say it. We will exempt you for today. Thank you very much.

Approval of minutes.

MR. GALLOWAY: I've reviewed, they look good.

MS. LUHTA: Me, too.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Okay. We will approve the March 15, 2017, special and regular meeting minutes and the March 27th special meeting minutes.

Elected official reports, Amy.

MS. DAWSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. As of March 31st, we were 25 percent of the way through the calendar year. The Treasury balance for the 20 funds within the Township Treasury was \$7.3 million. We just received the first half of the 2016 real estate taxes. The Treasury balance includes \$1,023,043 in funds set aside for specific projects.

Year-to-date revenue is 46 percent of the annual budgeted resources and expenditures were 17 percent of the Treasury balance for 2017. So we are well within budget.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Thank you very much.

Chris, anything?

MR. GALLOWAY: I don't have anything, no. 1 MS. LUHTA: Nor do I. 2 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Okay. I don't have anything 3 4 special to report. MS. LUHTA: Oh, one thing, I went to the Boy Scout 5 Eagle Scout thing on Sunday and it was very nice. And I was 6 able to tell them in detail what Andy -- no, Alex Spondike did 7 for us at the Old Stone School. 8 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Good, good. 9 MR. GALLOWAY: Right. 10 MS. LUHTA: And the audience was very appreciative. 11 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Where did they hold that at? 12 13 MS. LUHTA: This one was at the First Church Congregational because it was -- he was a member of Troop 68. 14 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Sixty-eight. 15 MS. LUHTA: And they're the ones that do 16 our memorial. 17 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Sixty-eight is a big troop. 18 19 MR. GALLOWAY: It is a big troop. MS. LUHTA: Yeah. That is why I always want to go 20 21 there. 22 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Good. Thank you. 23 MS. LUHTA: You are welcome. 24 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Administration Department, 25 Kathy, what have you got for us? 26 MS. MITCHELL: I have a couple of announcements 27 tonight. First off, with regard to the traffic improvements on 44, I want to make note -- and this date is tentative at the 28 moment but it's just worth noting nonetheless -- we are going 29 to have the signals down on Tuesday, April 11th. You'll be 30

able to get through State Route 44 but there will be some detouring to Capital Parkway and there will be a trooper on site to facilitate the closure.

It's just a temporary closure for a few hours. They have to install a permanent cabinet for the traffic signalization and the preemptors at that intersection there at Auburn and Crile and 44, so it's critical. We had a temporary cabinet installed in December and now this is the permanent cabinet going in. So there will be some, again, some slight down time but traffic will be maintained.

I also want to note myself and Deb Esker and Heather Freeman had a nice visit with the executive director of Vista Springs Quail Highlands today. She wanted to introduce herself and just let us know that she is here. Very, very impressed. This is the licensed residential care facility that's going to be opening up in June on Auburn Road just south of the roundabout. And I have to say, after meeting her, I am, myself, excited about them coming. It really seems as though their -- her heart is in the right place and just she's driven into what she does. It is kind of, as she put it, a calling.

They -- Just a little bit of information about, about the facility, it will be housing 70 assisted living apartments and 24 memory care apartments, again, emphasizing the word "apartment." It is a home but it is not a nursing home. But there is, there is different styles of apartments, studios and one- and two-bedroom. They are on a month-to-month fee basis. There is no upfront fees, unlike some other facilities. And they are appealing to more active adults. They are not going to be sitting around the table playing Bingo. They're going to go out and do field trips and she said they make it fun and

they personalize it for the individuals needs of their residents.

So, again, I think it's just nice to know that they are, they are going to be part of the community and they are very happy to be there. They are going to be holding a community open house at Quail Hollow Resort on April 20th and 27th from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. to introduce themselves and answer any questions because their facility is not open yet.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Okay.

MS. MITCHELL: They will be having a grand opening in June and they will let us know when that is and certainly would like to have us be there. They've already agreed to do some sponsoring of Community Days. So if there is any questions with regard to it -- Again, I know we have received a lot of questions but the executive director, her name is Terry Sombat, and she can be reached at (216) 408-5629. Again, if you need that information, feel free to call me or also call Deb Esker, the Recreation Director, and we will be happy to point you in the right direction or get you in touch with her.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: So do they have, I mean, potential residents already, like, signed up that are waiting to come in or are they starting from scratch?

MS. MITCHELL: I know she is, I know she's got some lined -- She didn't give us a firm number as to how many but she's getting a ton of inquiries. I believe, you know, they've, they've got existing facilities elsewhere but they're not close by.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Right.

MS. MITCHELL: So I think they're really trying to appeal to Lake County. She' actually been doing this for 30

plus years, so she actually has a presence already. She used to be with Heartland.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Okay.

MS. MITCHELL: She's been around. A lot of people know her. Again, I was honestly really impressed with her. I was really happy that she reached out and I think it's going to be a great facility. So --

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Good, great. I mean, we talk about economic development on a daily basis and, you know, now you are seeing it actually happen, so great.

Okay. Fire Department, Chief, what've you got for us?

CHIEF SABO: Well, for the month of March, we had a total of 218 calls, 14 motor vehicle crashes, 19 agency assists, 7 fire alarms, 8 wires down, 28 basic rescues, 95 advanced paramedic rescues, 15 public assists and 1 structure fire. That was a chimney fire. It did not extend to the structure but all our chimney fires are classified as structure fires.

In our Inspection Bureau, we had performed 4 plan reviews and the following inspections: They did 25 general inspections; 4 information updates; 23 follow-up inspections; 6 hood, kitchen hood suppression checks; 1 clean agent inspection; 1 -- or 2 fire protection inspections; 7 fire alarm inspections; 3 license inspections; 9 sprinkler system inspections; and 1 special inspection. I am not really sure what that's in reference to but I am sure it was special.

Public education, it was -- they went out and visited one elementary school and did one building consultation and one fire protection consultation.

I do want to say that I had the opportunity this morning to participate or I was invited by Lake Health to sit in on their hospital incident command system training, so that was this morning, to give me some insight into how they are going to respond in the event of an emergency and how their system can integrate into ours. So it was an excellent training and I appreciate the invite by Lake Health.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: When you say "system," what do you -- what system?

CHIEF SABO: The hospital incident command systems.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Okay.

CHIEF SABO: So it's a whole hierarchy of planning and mitigating an emergency. So they have their own internal system for handling those emergencies and we have external plans and they actually mend very well together, so it was a good exercise.

Safety tip for this month: A reminder that no parking is permitted on the hydrant side of any township or county road. All emergency vehicles need immediate access to fire hydrants and having those, that one lane available, of roadway available to us helps us get to the emergency scenes. Our vehicles are not small, so that's necessary moving forward. It's difficult to accomplish access when cars are parked on both the hydrant and nonhydrant sides of the street and in cul-de-sacs. So help us help you and please abide by the Concord Township parking solution.

MR. GALLOWAY: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Thanks, Chief.

Frank, snow is over, road construction begins, right?

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$  GALLOWAY: You just said that and it is going to snow on Friday.

MR. KRASKA: Stealing my thunder.

MR. GALLOWAY: It's Paul's fault now. Everyone heard him say it.

MR. KRASKA: He started it.

MR. GALLOWAY: That's right.

MR. KRASKA: Good evening.

MS. LUHTA: Good evening.

MR. KRASKA: During March, we had 8 dispatches for snow and ice removal. It seems like a faded memory now. For the season, we had a total of 61 dispatches not counting this Friday if it's required. During those dispatches, we dispensed 2,750 tons of rock salt, which is a lower than usual average for the season which we, on the average, we usually use about 3,200 tons. So, right now, we are doing fairly well in that category.

Other activities during March included constructing display boards and shadow boxes for the Old School House, performed ground maintenance at the Community Center, including drainage work, and installed a new entrance gate at Barchester Park. We cleaned roadside ditches on Bridlewood Drive, Stuart Drive, Kellogg Road, along with a driveway culvert installation on Martinique Drive.

As we enter April, Concord Township will be advertising for our annual road resurfacing program. This year's improvement will take place on Tanglewood Trail, Buckingham Place, a portion of Mount Royal Drive, Augusta Lane, Crooked Stick, Oakmont Way, Castle Pines and Pine Valley. As part of the Little Mountain Subdivision improvements, Service

Department crews will retrofit each cul-de-sac with a 60-foot diameter island to comply with current Township cul-de-sac standards, improve drainage and eliminate unnecessary impervious surface that serves no beneficial purpose.

We have also contracted with Industrial Surface
Sealer and Company to repair and refinish our Concord Hills
tennis courts and basketball court. Also planned for Concord
Hills Park is the repaving of the walking path.

Later this month, we will be restoring the playing surface on our baseball field with a new infield mix here on the Town Hall Campus and in preparation -- in preparation for this year's girls' youth softball and boys' youth baseball leagues that participate there.

Another improvement will be the addition of new soccer goals on the soccer field on Concord-Hambden Road along with turf improvements at that location as well.

MS. LUHTA: Thank you.

MS. DAWSON: Thanks, Frank.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Thanks, Frank.

Kathy, you're back up on Zoning Department.

MS. MITCHELL: In the month of March, the Zoning Department issued 44 zoning permits, 13 of which for single-family dwellings, and collected a total of just over \$5,500 in fees. When you look at and compare those numbers year to date with 2016, dwellings are pretty much on track. There is just

four less than last year -- we're 21 year to date as opposed to 25 last year -- but overall permits are up. We have issued 78 permits year to date as opposed to this time last year at 64. So I know, definitely, Heather and her staff have been extremely busy and I think the permits are a testament to that.

They, also, the Board of Zoning Appeals had a meeting during the month of March for one variance request -- it was a residential request -- on March 8 and that was approved. And that's all I have.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Thank you.

Debra, Recreation Department, what have you got?

MS. ESKER: Good evening, everybody. Your Concord

Township Recreation Department has a variety of interesting and entertaining activities planned for April. For example, earlier today our 55 Plus Group learned some fascinating facts about Cleveland at our "Cleveland Trivia Party Game Show."

Everyone was a contestant, everyone won a prize, and everyone had pie. So, basically, everybody had a great time and went home a little richer in Cleveland history. Let me share a few.

Did you know former Cleveland Safety Director Elliot Ness brought gangster Al Capone to justice? Pretty much, you know that.

What about celebrity chef Michael Symon attended St. Edward High School in Lakewood?

And another nationally known Italian chef got his start in Cleveland and that would be Chef Boyardee. I am not making it up. Hector Boiardi was born in Italy but opened his first restaurant on East 9th in 1926.

So Cleveland has a lot to celebrate. And we like to bring local history to our 55 Group as much as possible, so the

next 55 Plus Group gathering will take place on Wednesday,
April 19th, when a speaker from the Cleveland Metroparks
presents "The History of the Cleveland Flats." Our 50 Plus -55 Plus Group meets every first and third Wednesday of the
month at the Concord Community Center on Auburn Road.

Spring is a great to time to take a new class. In April, the Recreation Department offers photography classes, Windows for Adults, Essential Oils 101, Essential Oils Make and Take Body Scrub class, Cupcakes for any Occasion, Cooking for Cinco De Mayo, and Springtime Treats For Kids cooking classes. There are still seats available in most classes, so sign up soon. You can go to ConcordTwp.com and click on "Community Recreation Registration" then click on "Programs" and you can view all of our current class offerings.

And, of course, the big event for April is the Township's Annual Easier Egg Hunt, which will be held this Saturday, April 8th, at the ball field on the Town Hall Campus at 7229 Ravenna Road. The hunt begins promptly at 11:00 a.m. It takes place rain or shine or sleet or snow, so please dress your little hunters accordingly. Come out and meet the Easter Bunny and tour a fire truck. Thanks to First Federal Lakewood Bank in Concord and Texas Roadhouse Restaurant for sponsoring our hunt this year. And thanks to a special Concord resident, who always likes to remain anonymous, who donates over 2,000 prize-filled Easter eggs to our hunt every year, and it happened again this year.

Everyone is invited to attend the Library Book Day at Old Stone School on Saturday, April 29th, from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. where we will hold a brief dedication ceremony for Concord Township's first Little Free Library that will be

located near the School House entrance. The library is made possible by the Friends of Morley Library and we are grateful for their kind donation. Members of the Friends Board will be on hand for the ceremony.

If you love to garden but don't have the space, rent a plot at Concord's Community Garden located behind the Old Stone School on Ravenna. As of today, we only have a few 10 by 20 nonorganic plots left. So contact the Recreation Department soon if you are interested.

Everyone is encouraged to view the latest Trustee Fireside Chat that is being broadcast on the Township's cable station and is also available on our website. It's a great summary of the completion of the recent road improvements in the Auburn/Crile/44/Capital Parkway area.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Thank you.

MR. GALLOWAY: Thank you, for sure.

MS. DAWSON: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Concord law enforcement report, Sheriff's Department.

SERGEANT HARPSTER: Good evening.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Good evening.

SERGEANT HARPSTER: For the month of March, the

Sheriff's Office handled 1,530 calls for service. There were three injury accidents, 11 private property damage accidents. We had an adult male arrest for a TPO violation, domestic violence, three adult male arrests or OVI, one of those with an additional child endangering, and an adult male arrest for a weapons while intoxicated and another child endangering charge.

We had 280 cards open for crime prevention, 26 citations were issued, 171 traffic warnings. We had three people driving under suspension, three driving while intoxicated. We had an assault on Old Johnnycake Road; B and E to vehicle on Prouty; a burglary on Concord-Hambden; a check, bad checks complaint on Chestnut; two drugs calls, one on Capital Parkway and one on Auburn Road; three sex offenses, one on Auburn Road, one on Skylineview Drive and one on Palmer. We had thefts on Windmill, Cherry Hill, Oakridge, Fredle, Pinehill and Mountain ash. And we had a threats complaint on Auburn Road and vandalism complaints on -- two on Auburn Road and one on Yellowwood Drive. And that is all I have for you.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Okay. Thank you. Plenty.

Audience portion, anybody from the audience, any

comment? Old business, no old business. New, new business, March financial reports.

MR. GALLOWAY: Mr. Chairman, I make a motion to approve the March financial reports as presented to this Board by the Fiscal Officer.

MS. LUHTA: Second.

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: All in favor say "aye."

(Three aye votes, no nay votes.)

CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Resolution 2017-08, Lake County Auditor's Resolution for the Fire Department levy renewal.

MS. LUHTA: A Resolution by the Concord Township 1 Board of Trustees, Lake County, Ohio, requesting that the 2 County Auditor certify the total current tax valuation of 3 Concord Township and the dollar amount of revenue that would be 4 generated by the renewal of the 2.7 mill fire levy. I move 5 that we approve this Resolution. 6 MR. GALLOWAY: I will second. 7 8 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: All in favor say "aye." 9 (Three aye votes, no nay votes.) MR. GALLOWAY: I would make a motion to appoint Rick 10 Gorjup, also known as Donald Gorjup, to the Audit Committee to 11 fulfill the term ending December 31, 2018. 12 13 MS. LUHTA: Second. CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: All in favor say "aye." 14 (Three aye votes, no nay votes.) 15 MR. GALLOWAY: Mr. Chairman, I would make a motion 16 17 authorizing the suspension of Firefighter Douglas Bode for a period of six months and a reduction in rank from part-time 18 19 lieutenant to part-time firefighter/paramedic, and directing the Fire Department Chief to confirm such action with said 20 employee effective 3/27/17. 21 22 MS. LUHTA: Second. CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: All in favor say "aye." 23 24 (Three aye votes, no nay votes.) CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: A motion for Super Blanket 25 26 Certificate 104-2017 for the Harrisburg purchases not to exceed the cost of \$20,000 for uniforms and equipment. 27 MS. LUHTA: So moved. 28 MR. GALLOWAY: I will second. 29 30 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: All in favor say "aye."

(Three aye votes, no nay votes.) 1 MR. GALLOWAY: I would make a motion to approve 2 P.O. 22-2017 to Shepp Electric at a cost of \$15,000 for a 3 4 generator. MS. LUHTA: Second. 5 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: This generator is for --6 MS. DAWSON: Fire station. 7 MR. GALLOWAY: Fire station. 8 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Fire Department. 9 MR. GALLOWAY: But it also supports operations here 10 at Town Hall in the event of a fire -- a fire -- a power 11 12 outage. 13 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: That's what I wanted to clear up because we have another generator on here. So all in favor say 14 "ave." 15 (Three aye votes, no nay votes.) 16 17 MS. LUHTA: I move to approve Purchase 28-2017 to the Health and Fitness Equipment Centers for treadmills at a cost 18 19 of \$6,517. MR. GALLOWAY: I will second that. 20 21 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: All in favor say "aye." 22 (Three aye votes, no nay votes.) CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Is there a motion to promote 23 24 probationary firefighter Leonard Meek to probationary firefighter/paramedic effective March 10, 2017? 25 MS. LUHTA: So moved. 26 27 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Second, Chris? MR. GALLOWAY: Second. 28 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Second by Chris. All in favor 29 30 say "aye."

(Three aye votes, no nay votes.) 1 CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: Okay. So we have bids for stone 2 and tar. 3 MR. GALLOWAY: Oh, yeah. CHAIRMAN MALCHESKY: And so we have Osborne, Inc., 5 who bid the delivered prices of ODOT 499 Class C concrete for 6 \$106 cubic yard, ODOT 499 Class MS concrete for \$115 cubic 7 8 yards is their delivery prices, ODOT 499 FS concrete for \$124 cubic yards, and ODOT 613 Class LSM concrete for \$68 cubic 9 yards. And, again, that's Osborne, Inc., at 7954 Reynolds 10 Road. 11 Whereas, Osborne Concrete and Stone in Grand River 12 13 bid out ODOT 301 asphalt concrete base at 45 a ton, \$45 a ton, and ODOT 480 -- 448 surface course asphalt at \$54.75 a ton, and 14 ODOT 448 intermediate course asphalt at \$48 a ton. They, 15 additionally, bid out limestone and these are all limestone 16 17 bids: ODOT 304 -- I am sorry -- Number 4 at \$19.10 a ton, ODOT 304 at \$13.80 a ton, 57 at \$18.75 a ton, 8 at \$20.20 a ton, 1 18 and 2 at \$18.88 -- or 80 cents a ton, 67 at \$18.75 a ton, ODOT 19 411 at \$14.20 a ton, Number 9 washed, with an asterisk at 20 Number 8 --21 22 MR.
