CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: I now declare the public hearing for the 2017 Tax Budget open.

MS. DAWSON: Thank you, Mrs. Luhta.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Would you like to go?

MS. DAWSON: I would love to. Okay. The 2017
Concord Township Tax Budget needs to be adopted prior to
July 15th every year and submitted to the Lake County Auditor.
So, this year, we are requesting a total of \$7,335,000 in
funds. This is just for the Inside Millage Fund, the General
Fund, and the Road and Bridge Fund, and the three levy funds
that we currently have, the Fire Levy, the Road Levy and the
Safety Services Levy.

So in the General Fund, we're requesting \$910,000; the Road and Bridge Fund, \$1,025,000; the Fire Levy Fund, \$1,650,000; the Road Levy Fund, \$1,050,000; and in the Safety Services Levy, \$2.7 million.

So if you, at the point in time that you decide to close the public hearing and vote on that, at that point, we then send it to the Auditor and then they have hearings at the county level and then the Budget Commission votes on it. Then we get the actual budget later on. So --

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Okay. Are there any comments from the audience? Any questions? Do you have any?

MR. GALLOWAY: I have none, Madam Chairman.

MR. MALCHESKY: I have none.

MS. DAWSON: Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: We will be back in five minutes

for our regular meeting. 1 (Whereupon, the public hearing was closed at 2 7:26 p.m. and there was a recess.) 3 7:31 p.m. CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: I now declare the regular meeting 5 of the Concord Township Board of Trustees open and it is 6 July 6, 2006. Please join me in the Pledge of Allegiance 7 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.) 8 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Amy, may we have the roll call? 9 MS. DAWSON: Mr. Galloway? 10 MR. GALLOWAY: Here. 11 MS. DAWSON: Mrs. Luhta? 12 13 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Here. MS. DAWSON: Mr. Malchesky? 14 MR. MALCHESKY: Present. 15 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: We have approval of minutes tabled 16 and so we'll go on to elected official reports. Amy, do you 17 18 have a report? I do. As of June 30th, we were 50 19 MS. DAWSON: percent of the way through the calendar year. The treasury 20 21 balance for the 21 -- sorry -- 22 funds within the Township 22 treasury was \$6.9 million. Treasury balance includes \$881,271 23 in funds set aside for specific projects. 24 Year-to-date expenditures as of June 30th were 29 percent of the amount appropriated for 2006. Revenue received 25 26 year to date is 47 percent. So we are well within budget. 27 I will be asking the Trustees to vote on the 2017 Tax 28 Budget this evening and we'll have revised revenue and 29 appropriations for them to vote on at the next meeting. 30 If you have any other financial questions, please do

not hesitate to call our office, 354-7516. 1 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Thank you. 2 MS. DAWSON: You are welcome. 3 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Trustees. MR. MALCHESKY: I have nothing --5 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: 6 Paul. MR. MALCHESKY: I have nothing to report except I 7 8 will let Chris talk a little bit about what we did today. MR. GALLOWAY: No. You talk about it. Go ahead. 9 MR. MALCHESKY: No, no. I insist that you talk about 10 it. 11 12 MR. GALLOWAY: Well, okay. Do you want me to talk 13 about it now? CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Yes. 14 MR. GALLOWAY: Okay. 15 MR. MALCHESKY: No. You know what? Let's talk about 16 it next week. 17 MR. GALLOWAY: Well, Paul and I were joined by 18 Mrs. Dawson and Ms. Mitchell and Bruce Bullard and Chief Sabo 19 were in attendance and our videographer, Rick, was there. 20 21 we had the pleasure of doing the groundbreaking for the new 22 development on Crile Road called Crile Crossing. And that's an 23 exciting next step in the services development in our 24 Auburn-44-Crile Corridor because what is, of course, the worst kept secret in Concord, of course, many people know that that 25 26 development is going to include the new Starbucks for Concord. 27 So we had the pleasure of -- with the help of the 28 Chamber of Commerce, the Eastern Lake County Chamber of Commerce. Connie was not able to be there because she was 29 30 doing chairman duties at something that she will talk about.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Right. 1 MR. GALLOWAY: But so, unfortunately, we had to, sort 2 of, divide and conquer all our things at one time today. 3 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Right. Everything was on the same 4 5 day. MR. GALLOWAY: But we were joined by the developer, 6 7 Lance Osborne, along with his partners, represent -- the broker 8 representing Starbucks and some of the businesses, as well as 9 some other folks in the community, and there was the groundbreaking today. So we broke out the gold shovels. 10 hopefully, this will be the first of many exciting projects 11 coming forward in that area. 12 13 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Good. MR. GALLOWAY: So it was an exciting thing to get 14 done. 15 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Save the shovels. 16 17 MR. GALLOWAY: We're not, we're not getting rid of them. 18 19 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Okay. So I went to Firehouse Subs and -- with the firemen because Firehouse Subs Foundation gave 20 21 our Fire Department a \$10,000 grant to buy smoke detectors, and 22 we were joined by two other departments. MR. GALLOWAY: Munson and another one. What was the 23 24 other? Do you remember the third? 25 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: No, I can't remember but it was 26 Lorain County. MR. GALLOWAY: Oh. 27 28 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: And there was only one 29 representative there. He was the only EMT. MR. GALLOWAY: Oh. 30

MR. GALLOWAY: We were all running around all over the place.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Right. We had to be represented at both places and I got the best deal. Okay.

Department reports, Administration, Kathy Mitchell.

MS. MITCHELL: Just to give everyone an update with regard to the Auburn-Crile Connector Road Project, the work is, I guess, has been split up a little bit on Crile, finishing up the new relocated Crile Road, which everyone, hopefully, if you've gone down Crile, has had a chance to now drive the nicely new paved surface. They still have it down to a limited lane usage but, nonetheless, it's progress that we can now actually experience ourselves.

They're also working on the extension portion of the Capital Parkway Drive, which is, again, on the Auburn side west of 44. They are going to begin work on the roundabout. Well, they've technically begun work in terms of staging but they will actually -- the true construction will begin the last week of July, so we are getting close to that.

And, also, the work on the northern portion of Crile, as well as the northern portion of Auburn east of 44, will begin here in the coming months. I would say from August through October or November, we will see that work.

And to kind of highlight and give those property owners, businesses and residents that are interested more information on that detour and construction schedule for that northern portion, we are going to hold an open house next Tuesday, July 12th, at the Concord Community Center, and that's going to go from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. So anybody is welcome to attend that. We will have a bunch of nice, pretty maps to

explain and better depict the detour routes for everybody and, hopefully, ease the inconveniences that will be experienced during that time, but all for a good cause.

So any other information regarding that, please keep checking our website. The updated maps, detour maps will be on there within the week. If you go to Concordtwp.com and actually look at the scroll that's on the home page, there is actually a page on there dedicated to the construction and there is a link right there that you can click on and have more information. So --

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Thank you.

MS. MITCHELL: That's all I have.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Thank you. Fire Department, Chief Matt Sabo.

CHIEF SABO: Good evening, everyone.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Good evening.

CHIEF SABO: I want to thank Trustee Luhta for joining the Fire Department at Firehouse Subs today. That was a nice event. And their donation or their grant allows us to continue the smoke alarm installation program for our township, so that's very beneficial for us to make sure everyone has a working smoke detector in their home.

For June of 2016, we had a total of 192 events: 13 motor vehicle crashes, 21 agency assists, 10 fire alarms, two wires down, 23 basic EMS rescues, 77 advanced paramedic rescues, 15 public assists, and two structure fires.

Our fire prevention staff remain, remain busy. They had five plan reviews, 43 general inspections, 18 follow-up inspections, five hood, kitchen hood suppression system inspections, seven fire alarm inspections, five sprinkler

system inspections, three tent canopy inspections, three fire drills, and three consults.

Our education staff stayed busy with seven public relations events, and we're booking them all the time and filling our calendar and getting out in the community to meet, to meet everyone and give everyone a chance to see what Concord Fire Department is all about.

We installed one residential lock box and we have two new participants to the smoke detector program.

Today we use cell phones or smartphones for nearly everything. Landline phones are becoming a thing of the past. The use of the new style phones has created a problem with emergency dispatch centers. So we urge everyone to register their mobile device with the Lake County Emergency Management Agency.

But the biggest problem that they're seeing is people that carry their phones in their pocket that accidentally might dial 911. And so it takes a lot of time for the dispatcher to have to listen to a conversation before it's disconnected because they don't know if it's really an emergency or not. So we urge people not to carry their devices in their pockets, then they can't heat up.

So what we -- Two things to help clear, clear this problem up: Don't carry your phone in your pocket and register your phone with the local Emergency Management Agency. You can go to LakeCountyOhio.gov and select "County Departments" and click on "Emergency Management Agency" and sign up for reverse 911 and complete the form. Once that's done, you can -- you will be notified of any reverse 911 for your address as appropriate.

The last thing, I want to invite everyone to the Fire Department on August 3rd from 11:00 to 4:00. We will be having a blood drive by the American Red Cross. So your donation is appreciated and we look forward to seeing everyone out there. So thank you very much.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Thank you.

MS. DAWSON: Thank you.

MR. GALLOWAY: Thanks, Chief. Yeah, I would encourage everybody to register their cell phone for reverse 911 because, I mean, a great example of that is when we had the active shooter here.

CHIEF SABO: Yes.

MR. GALLOWAY: You know, when they were doing those, those kinds of emergencies, you know, for those of us who've gotten rid of our landlines, that's really important to want to have access to that kind of information. So I would echo the Chief's statements and encourage people to do that.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Okay. Thank you. Next is the Service Department, Frank Kraska.

MR. KRASKA: Good evening.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Good evening.

MS. DAWSON: Good evening.

MR. KRASKA: I would like to first remind our residents that we have wood chips available on a first come, first service basis that were produced during our brush dropoff on June 4th. At that time, we collected an estimated 35 yards of brush and 72 yards of bagged yard waste, which we, in turn, recycled. And pickups for this, the wood chips and that, can be made Monday through Friday during our regular business hours. Again, we have quite a bit right now, so we encourage

residents to take advantage of that.

Meanwhile, during the month of June, Township crews completed reconstruction of 1,182 square yards of concrete road sections on the following roads: Beres, Quail Hollow Drive, Mountain Quail, Buckboard Lane and Hansom Place. This program will continue next week on Conestoga Trail, followed by Yellowwood Trail and Sweetgum.

In addition, we completed roadside ditching on Huntoon Road, Fay Road, South Orchard with driveway culvert installations, Oakhurst, Timberlane, Pinehill. We had a partial ditch enclosure removal on Skylineview and Ridgeview Trail, along with storm sewer repairs on Mountain Park. And we also cleaned easements on Weathersfield and South Meadow.

At this time, we've also completed about 50 percent of this season's crack seal program.

As for major project updates, Catts Construction

Company has begun to rebuild the remaining portion of Far Hill

Drive and approximately 1,000 feet of Christian Avenue as

Phase 2 of our long-range program. Work has gone fairly well

so far except for interruption in cable services due to the

practice of cable companies not burying service lines at

recommended depths to avoid conflicts with this type of

improvement. Obviously, what they're encountering is they peel

up the concrete along with the cable wires, and it's almost

impossible to avoid that during this type of construction. So

they're trying to be prompt and responsive getting everybody

rehooked up. But that's the only thing that's been a nuance so

far. So --

Concord is also currently advertising for bids to improve drainage and road infrastructure on Melridge Drive. A

State of Ohio grant and assistance from Lake County Stormwater 1 will help fund these improvements on Melridge Drive. Further 2 details and schedules will be forthcoming later this month. 3 For any other information, please visit the Concord Township website for current activities and most recent updates 5 of our Service Department news. 6 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Thank you, Frank. 7 8 MR. KRASKA: You're welcome. Thank you. 9 MR. GALLOWAY: Zoning Department, Bruce Bullard. 10 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: MR. MALCHESKY: Bruce did an excellent job on those 11 12 shovels today. 13 MR. BULLARD: Good evening. This past month, we issued five permits for new homes. That brings us up to a 14 total of 52 in the first half versus 41 in the first half last 15 year. We had a total of 48 permits issued this month, which 16 gave us 214 versus 172 last year at this time. So building is, 17 you know, progressing very nicely in the township. Commercial 18 work is also progressing. 19 We had two variance requests last month, both of 20 21 which were approved, and we have three variance requests coming 22 up on the 13th. So that's my report for the evening. 23 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Thank you. 24 MR. GALLOWAY: Thank you, Bruce. CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: And next is Debra Esker for the 25 26 Recreation Department. 27 MS. ESKER: Good evening. 28 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Good evening. MS. ESKER: It is summertime and the Recreation 29

Department is offering many fun activities to enhance your

30

summertime enjoyment. There are still openings for students in our summer Tennis Camp for Kids July 11th through July 15th and July 25th through 29th. Instructor Paul Engel teaches basic grips, forehand, backhand, serving, volley, scoring and net play.

We welcome kids ages 6 to 11 to our last few sessions of our Concord Kids Camp on July 12th, 19th and 26th. Camp participants will explore the Old Stone School, go on a scavenger hunt, learn to prepare simple snacks, see a fire engine up close and personal, and win fun prizes and a rollicking bingo marathon.

Our summer concert series kicked off last week with the Chardon Polka Band who rocked the gazebo at the Concord Town Hall. You know it's a good time when you see the polka dancers come out. Our summer concerts continue every Thursday in July at 7:00, so get ready for InCahoots, a top 10 band, tomorrow evening, July 7th; Prime Time Big Band is on July 14th; and Eagles tribute band, FastLane, performs on July 21st. Our summer concerts conclude with Bluestone Union, a rock band, on July 28th. The concerts are free and all are welcome. Just bring your own chair or a blanket to sit on. And vendors this year include East Coast Custard and Kettle Corn.

Thanks to everyone who attended our annual 55 Plus Group Independence Day picnic today. We feasted on Jimmy's Backyard BBQ and we listened to the Flashbaxx Band. Our next 55 Plus Group gathering is Wednesday, July 20th, when the Lake County Historical Society presents "The Lake County Story," including interesting facts about the development of our fair county, as well as famous residents and connections.

And looking ahead to August, mark your calendar for Concord Community Days on August 12th and 13th. Uncorked is back on Friday, August 12th. Enjoy local wines, craft beer, food vendors, a fantastic Chinese raffle, and shop the work of talented local artisans all while enjoying the music of the Diamond Project Band. Five dollar admission, but tickets are available now at the Concord Community Center and also online at Concordtwp.com.

Saturday, August 13th is Family Day. The morning begins with the annual 5K run and pancake breakfast. And then be sure to settle in at the intersection of Route 608 and Ravenna by 4:00 p.m. to watch the Concord Community Parade march by. Immediately after the parade, enjoy a bounty of evening activities on the Town Hall Campus. Kids will love the rock wall bungee trampoline and giant inflatables in Kids' World. They will compete in Concord's traditional Frog Jump Contest (frogs are provided). Kids of all ages will enjoy the interactive toy trains (air whistle provided) as well as the Outback Ray Animal Show. Then grab dinner from a variety of food vendors as you cheer on local bands competing in our very first Battle of the Bands. Enjoy a variety of craft beers during the Abbey Rodeo concert and stay for the fabulous fireworks finale.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Thank you.

Okay. Next one is Concord law enforcement report.

SERGEANT DURST: Sorry I am late. I'm in charge on afternoons today. Captain Dondorfer couldn't make it.

Sergeant Don Durst is my name.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Thank you.

SERGEANT DURST: For Concord for the month of June, there were a total of 1,282 calls for service. As the fire chief alluded to, we responded to five injury accidents and nine property damage crashes in Concord. There were a total of three arrests, two adult females were arrested for domestic violence and one adult male was arrested for disorderly conduct. There were 71 alarms at businesses and residences in the month of Concord -- or in the month of June for Concord. Deputies conducted 215 business checks at businesses during the day and afternoon hours when they were open.

Also, there were 250 crime prevention or community policing numbers that were created for the month of June. This includes nighttime hours, deputies checking construction sites and looking for open doors and gates and things of that nature on either garage doors or at businesses.

There were a total of eight traffic citations written in the month of June and 75 traffic warnings were written.

And there were a total of 23 new criminal investigations begun: Two abuse cases, a breaking and entering, two burglaries, two bad checks cases were received, one reported rape, 11 theft complaints, two vandalisms, and one stolen vehicle was reported. That's all I have.

CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Thank you, Sergeant Durst. 1 MR. GALLOWAY: Thank you, Sergeant. Appreciate it. 2 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: You are welcome to come back 3 anytime. 4 SERGEANT DURST: Well, thank you. I've been here 5 once before. 6 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Okay. And we have no Riverside 7 8 School District report. So is there anyone in the audience who 9 would like to say anything? No. Okay. We will move on. MR. MALCHESKY: While we are talking about the 10 school, did they ever decide where they're going to put those 11 elementary schools? 12 13 MR. GALLOWAY: They're still working on that. CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Yeah. 14 MR. MALCHESKY: I am going to grab someone in 15 Painesville Township, one of the Painesville Township trustees, 16 and I'm going to go over and see Riverside Schools. 17 MR. GALLOWAY: You want to talk about the 18 fairgrounds, don't you? 19 MR. MALCHESKY: I do. I absolutely do. 20 21 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Yep, I know that. 22 MR. GALLOWAY: I like where your head's at. 23 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Yeah. Sounds good. No old 24 business. We will move to new business. June financial 25 reports, Amy. 26 MR. GALLOWAY: I make a motion to approve those as 27 presented to this Board. 28 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Okay. MR. MALCHESKY: I second. 29 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: All in favor? 30

(Three aye votes, no nay votes.) 1 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Okay. There is a Resolution for 2 somebody. 3 MR. MALCHESKY: We have in front of me Resolution 4 5 2016-19 to approve 2017 Tax Budget as outlined in our public hearing not too long ago, which was approximately 25 minutes 6 7 ago. 8 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Right. MR. GALLOWAY: Give or take two minutes. 9 MR. MALCHESKY: Yeah. 10 MR. GALLOWAY: I will second that motion. 11 CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Any discussion? All in favor? 12 13 (Three aye votes, no nay votes.) CHAIRWOMAN LUHTA: Okay. And we will give that one 14 to Chris. 15 MR. MALCHESKY: Oh. 16 17 MS. DAWSON: Because you have to read this. MR. GALLOWAY: You're in the hot seat. 18 19 MR. MALCHESKY: All right. Well, I make a motion --Yes, I have to do this one. I make a motion to adopt 20 21 Resolution 2016-20 authorizing the Board, this Board, to enter 22 into an MOU -- that's a Memorandum of Understanding -- with the 23 Concord Township-City of Painesville Joint Economic Development 24 District, to which Concord Township belongs to, and to provide payment for Phase 2 and Phase 3 of the Risinger and Associates, 25 26 Inc.'s, professional services regarding the planning, 27 development and implementation of the Township's Town Center model. And we believe those costs are to be somewhere in the 28 nature of \$110,000, which would be the P.O. that we would pass 29 30 next.
