In 2022, Concord Township will celebrate its 200th Anniversary with a year-long series of special events, including a community-wide celebration held in partnership with local organizations and businesses. The Concord Township Bicentennial Committee is calling for entries to design Concord Township's Bicentennial logo. With spring fast approaching, residents will soon be thinking about home improvement projects, renovations or other additions to their home or property. Please keep in mind that a zoning permit is required from Concord Township prior to constructing any structures on your property. For example, the following projects are required to have zoning approval: building additions, structural alterations, decks, accessory buildings, swimming pools, fences, and other accessory structures including gazebos and pavilions. Such

buildings or structures must be built in compliance with size and height restrictions, as well as front, side and rear yard clearance requirements, as

specified in the Township Zoning Resolution. In addition, if there is a stream on your property, the structure may be required to be located a minimum of 25 feet from the stream's ordinary high water mark. This is referred to as a "riparian setback".

Similar to front, side and rear yard setbacks, riparian setbacks are required in order to protect areas along the banks of rivers, streams and wetlands (riparian areas) from construction impacts or other damaging activities. The streams and rivers can be as large as the Grand River or as small as a stream flowing intermittently through a woodland. The setback distances are established based on the 100-year floodplain and the amount of storm water runoff draining from a particular location to the water channel. Setbacks range from 25 feet to 120 feet.

These requirements are independent of any restrictions your property might be subject to as part of a Homeowner's Association or other deed restrictions. It is the property owner's responsibility to ensure that the proper permits are obtained prior to construction, either by the contractor/company hired to do the project or by the residents themselves. A zoning permit will still be required after construction, if one has not already been obtained.

The Zoning Department website at <https://concordtwp.com/departments/zoning/applications/> includes additional details about the zoning requirements and application fees for various projects. Prior to submitting an application for a zoning permit, applicants are strongly encouraged to call or stop in the office to ensure their project meets the zoning regulations and to review the submittal requirements.

Our below normal autumn season made it evident that snow and ice was soon to follow and promptly did so as our first response to these conditions was on November 10th.



Perhaps with the reintroduction of travel in less than desirable conditions came the benefit that it was on a Saturday morning when traffic volume was low

and schedules less demanding. Human nature has disciplined us to an exact period of time that we leave our house for work though just like daylight savings time we should adjust our travel time with the ever-changing weather conditions. You as a commuter should allow for an extended amount of time to commute to your work place, school or other activities. Adjustments in your travel plans by keeping well informed of pending weather conditions can save you the aggravations and consequences that may further complicate your day and perhaps others. If you are a new resident to Concord Township, the Service Department only maintains side streets and subdivision within our community. We currently have Concord Township divided into six sectors as a response method to snow and ice conditions. Crews are scheduled to best address road conditions prior to both school and rush hour traffic.

The Ohio Department of Transportation maintains Concord Hambden Road, Painesville Warren Road and Johnnycake Ridge Road. Lake County Road Department is responsible for all connector roads, for example; Crile, Girdled, Ravenna, Prouty, Button Hermitage, Pinecrest, Williams, Auburn and Morley Roads. The Service Department bases its preparation and response to winter conditions on advance weather monitoring and data available through multiple resources. Sometimes lake effect events are unpredictable and arrive during off hours. The Lake County Sheriff's Department often alerts the Service Department to changing conditions so that we can respond effectively. Current department strategy calls for crews to plow the streets as needed and treat hills, curves and intersections with deicers. Some roads that have recently been reconstructed may require the use of sand or grit to prevent damage to new pavement so always be prepared for changing conditions and exercise caution while traveling

in adverse conditions. Concord Service department will continue to maintain a sensible salting program. This means of response to frequently changing conditions is less destructive to our infrastructure and local environment.

Concord Township unlike other parts of Ohio where a typical snow event has a predictable duration of time our precipitation pattern can vary greatly. We are situated in a primary area south and east of Lake Erie that produces lake effect snow. Lake effect snow develops during cooler atmospheric conditions when cold winds move across the long expanse of Lake Erie's warmer water picking up water vapor which in turn freezes and accumulates as snow or sleet on the leeward side of the lake and the higher elevations for example



Concord Township. In order to achieve optimum results during snow removal, we ask residents and their contracted services to not plow or blow snow into the road right of way as it may create a hazard. Dispersing snow to either side your driveway is the appropriate method. Whenever possible remind your snow plow service to be courteous and not place snow onto other people's property or leave it in the roadway. Ohio revised code 4511.74 clearly states that no person shall place any obstruction in or upon any road without proper authority.

SPRING PREPARATION

In advance of our next construction season, the Service Department has been actively evaluating current road conditions. This requires completing steps necessary to acquire grant funding to help support major road improvements and achieve long-range goals through competent objectives. In January and February, we will work closely with Lake County Engineers office to prepare a bid package for the Far Hills subdivision Phase III road improvement program. This project will complete reconstruction and drainage improvements of Christian Avenue and Jason Avenue, which was originally constructed in 1976. Simultaneously we will also plan and schedule a wide range of maintenance and construction repair throughout the community to best address the areas in the most need of repair.

MAILBOX SNOW BARRICADES

The Service department will provide the labor to install snow barricades for residents living in Concord Township at no charge. The barricade consists of an aluminum board, two steel posts, reflective numbers and hardware. The materials must be purchased from Concord Township at the cost of \$40.00. Barricades absorb the impact of heavy snow being discharged by the snow plows. Please keep in mind that this barricade is not a guarantee that your mailbox will

not be damaged during the course of the winter season. If you are interested in having the Service Department install a snow barricade, please fill out the application and return to Town Hall. This will be a one-time installation and all maintenance thereafter is the responsibility of the resident. There will be a \$15.00 charge for any reinstallation of barricades.



FREE DRUG DISPOSAL KITS

According to the CDC, in 2016, nearly 64,000 Americans died from drug overdoses including from illicit medications and prescription opioids. According to the National Institutes of Health, 2/3 of individuals who use heroin began with misusing prescriptions. Disposing of unused medications does not have to be difficult. Concord Township is pleased to announce that we have received 200 safe drug disposal kits. These kits are easy to use and are available to our residents at no cost. Pick up a free drug disposal kit at either fire station, Town Hall, or the Community Center. If you have questions regarding this program, please contact the Fire Chief at 354-7504.



HELP US HELP YOU!

Time is the essence if you call us for help. Finding your address is often a challenge when we are buried in snow.

Keeping your house numbers visible allows us to find you quickly.

Also we ask for your assistance in keeping the fire hydrant on or near you property clear of snow. The department has the location of each hydrant listed. However, having to search for and dig out a hydrant buried in snow could delay the Fire Department response. If you are unable or need assistance clearing a hydrant, please call the department's non-emergency numbers 440-354-7508 or 440-354-7509.



The purchase of a new fire apparatus is no small task and Concord Fire Department is grateful to the Concord community for their continued support. While the formal process for the production of this apparatus began in mid-2017, the concept for this piece of equipment had been in development for many years. It is important to note that this piece of apparatus is not a typical structural response fire engine although it can function as such. Its primary role will be in response to vehicle crashes where extrication

is required. This required customizations to the chassis, cab, pump, and fire body to keep maintenance costs to a minimum. The Department can be reached at 440-639-4650. A full refund will be issued to enrollees if we cancel a class. All refunds are provided in the form of a check, regardless of how the original payment was made. If payment was made by check for one class, we may return your original check. If payment was made by check for multiple classes, please contact the Department for refund options. For classes with multiple sessions, no refunds will be made after the first class is held.

CANCELLATIONS

If a class is cancelled by the Concord Twp. Recreation Dept., you will be notified by phone. We welcome you to transfer to another class or receive a full refund. It takes two to three weeks to process refund checks. All refunds will be in the form of a check regardless of how payment was made. A class may be cancelled or combined due to low enrollment.
