CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Good evening. I would like to call to order the February 1, 2023, Concord Township Board of Trustee meeting. Would you all please rise and join me in the Pledge of Allegiance.

(Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.)
CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: And can I have a roll call,
please.

MR. TEKNIPP: Yes.

Mrs. Lucci?

MS. LUCCI: Present.

MR. TEKNIPP: Mr. Dondorfer?

MR. DONDORFER: Present.

MR. TEKNIPP: Mr. McIntosh?

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Present.

So we have some, we're going to kick off the meeting with something a little bit different. We've got some special guests here tonight. So we will have a swearing in for one of our firefighters and we will also have a presentation by one of our Lake County Commissioners. So I'd like to welcome all of our guests here.

And we will get things started with the swearing in of part-time firefighter/paramedic Grant Egensperger. Did I say that correctly?

Would you please raise your right hand.

(Whereupon, the oath of office was administered to Grant Egensperger.)

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Congratulations.

(Whereupon, pictures were taken.)

CHIEF SABO: Mr. Chairman, is it okay to dismiss the

family? 1 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Yes, it is. 2 CHIEF SABO: You guys are welcome to dismiss if 3 you'd like or you can stay for the meeting. CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: It's real exciting. 5 (Whereupon, there was a brief recess while some 6 7 audience members left the meeting.) CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Okay. Moving along, I would 8 like to welcome the newest Lake County Commissioner and former 9 mayor of Willowick, Mr. Rich Regovich, if you'd would like to 10 come forward. Thanks for being here. It's good to see you, 11 our newest elected official, out here in the township. 12 MR. DONDORFER: Welcome. 13 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thank you, thank you so much. 14 It is my distinct honor and pleasure to honor Amy Lucci and 15 Carl Dondorfer tonight on behalf of the Board of County 16 Commissioners. This is for completing the Ohio Township 17 Association Leadership Academy. So I stole these and took 18 19 them for myself because two of my favorite trustees and one of 20 my favorite townships here in Ohio, in Lake County. 21 would like to present these to both of you. 22 MR. DONDORFER: Appreciate it. 23 MR. REGOVICH: Congratulations. 24 MS. LUCCI: Thank you. 25 (Whereupon, pictures were taken.) 26 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Are taxes on the agenda tonight? 27 Sorry. I couldn't help myself. 28 MS. LUCCI: Oh, yes, you could. 29 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: It's all in good fun. 30 All right. Next item on the agenda was the approval

of the minutes from January 18, 2023, regular trustee meeting. 1 MR. DONDORFER: Mr. Chair, I will make a motion to 2 approve the January 18, 2023, regular trustees meeting 3 minutes. CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: And I will second that. 5 Any discussion? 6 MR. DONDORFER: 7 No. CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: And all in favor? 8 MS. LUCCI: I'll abstain. 9 10 (Two aye votes, no nay votes, one abstention.) CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Two ayes and one abstention. 11 Okay. Moving on to the Elected Official Reports, 12 Fiscal Officer James Teknipp. 13 Thank you, Mr. McIntosh. My report is 14 MR. TEKNIPP: short this evening. The January 23rd financial report is 15 being prepared and will be delivered to the Trustees at the 16 17 next trustees meeting. I am completing the 2022 financial footnotes which 18 will be included in the 2022 annual financial report. 19 20 the final step in preparing the 2022 annual financial report. 21 Upon completion of the footnotes, I will enclose the '22, 2022 22 financial year in our software, our accounting package UAN. 23 And once that is done, we can upload the 2022 financial 24 reports to the Auditor of State's Office. 25 And, finally, I would also like to schedule the annual appropriations meeting during the week of 26 27 February 20th. That's kind of a housekeeping item annually. 28 And this concludes my report. 29 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thank you, Mr. Teknipp. Trustees, do we want to --30

MS. LUCCI: Do you want to do that? 1 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Do we want to do that now or do 2 we want to -- So what is that, we're looking at our next --3 Oh, you said the week of, I'm sorry? MS. LUCCI: The 20th. 5 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: The 20th. 6 7 MR. DONDORFER: I am out the 19th through the 22nd, out of town. 8 MS. LUCCI: The 23rd? 9 10 MR. DONDORFER: I am in on the 23rd or the 24th. MS. LUCCI: 23rd at 4:00? 11 12 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Are we -- I've got a 7:00 that evening. 13 MR. DONDORFER: Why don't we roundtable this on 14 the --15 MS. LUCCI: The 27th? 16 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Why don't we, why don't we do 17 Yeah, we can do this afterwards. Let's not consume 18 19 meeting time. 20 MS. LUCCI: The staff meeting on the 27th, we can 21 maybe do it right after. 22 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Okay, yeah. We can look at 23 moving the staff meeting on the 27th and doing it then. 24 Okay. Moving things along then, we will get to the 25 Trustees Reports, starting with Mrs. Lucci. 26 MS. LUCCI: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Today is Ohio 27 Township Day. It is the 25th anniversary, first celebrated in 28 1998. The day was set aside to recognize the commitment from 29 the officers, the staff who promote the grass roots 30 government. Townships were the first form of government in

the state and there are over 1,300 townships, 1,308 to be exact, serving about 35 percent of the population of Ohio. So happy Ohio Township Day to everybody.

We had the opportunity to get together last week with the Ohio Township Association, our elected officials and staff from across the state for some education and some just great fellowship and getting together.

As far as resident communications, I did connect with a resident who had some suggestions about some zoning restrictions. I spoke with a resident regarding some traffic along Girdled. And I thank Sergeant Infalvi for responding quickly. He made sure that there was additional presence out in that area to check on traffic. I do want to stress the importance of safety and making sure our residents feel supported by law enforcement.

I did speak with another resident today regarding some water issues and some nuisance complaints. We did have some residents reach out regarding the recent sales tax with the county.

And I did want to thank Mr. Maxson for continuing to volunteer as our curator. He did report to me that the Schoolhouse had 365 visitors this year, which was the most we've ever had.

MR. ROSE: That's a record, I believe.

MS. LUCCI: Yeah, which was a record. And I do want to thank him for his service.

We did have a staff meeting on Monday, and I look forward to all the summer events that we are going to be hearing, that we're going to hear about from Rec.

And with that, that concludes by report.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thank you, Mrs. Lucci.

Mr. Dondorfer.

MR. DONDORFER: Thank you, Mr. McIntosh.

Yeah, we had a great conference at the Ohio Township Association this year. Not only the Trustees but our Administrator, Fiscal Officer, Zoning representation and our Service Director were down there. A lot of great classes. You know, Amy and I worked the last year through the Ohio Township Association Leadership Academy, which is a year process, completing several classes to make sure we do our due diligence as far as trustee work for the township. And I think it's a testament for all of us regarding that attendance and completion of those courses that everybody took that, you know, we work hard for our residents and for the township. So it was very beneficial.

A couple calls I received from some residents since the last meeting. Had an issue with, a road issue on Williams and Cascade that had a resident concerned, so we are working through that with our township Service Department, as well as the county.

And we had another call regarding some recent correspondence regarding the new program that the Lake County General Health District is rolling out as far as septic system annual inspections. So I'm trying to get some clarification for some residents that have septic systems that never had to participate in this program, so we are trying to do our due diligence and get them the information so we can report back to them.

And, yeah, Ohio Township Day today, as Trustee Lucci said. We've got 1,308 townships in Ohio and the townships

make up 35 percent of the state population, so it's pretty good representation of townships in the state.

So thank you.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thank you, Mr. Dondorfer.

Obviously, yes, Township Day is great. The more I spend time here in this township doing work with this form of government, the more I really do tend to appreciate it. It's, I am sure everybody thinks their form is great. We like it. It's hard work though. I mean, we are a lean government. It is, we have to do a lot with a little but it is definitely efficient. I like working with both of you and I like this form of government.

OTA Winter Conference is always a good and enjoyable time. And I would say, of all the years I've gone, I really feel like I got the most out of it. And I don't know if it's because I'm kind of getting dialed in on being a trustee and I'm really able to get the most out of it. It's great that we had staff come down with us and also take advantage of the material and information there. It's always good to get out of your bubble, hear from other townships, you know, get refreshed education and then bring back, because you bring back ideas and things that you wouldn't ordinarily, you know, catch up with. So it was a great, great time down there, really well spent.

And congratulations to you both for completing the Leadership. I know, get your certificate warmed up. Amy is working on 2.0. So she's going to do a project because OTA, last year, you are part of the inaugural class on that Leadership 2.0.

MR. DONDORFER: Yeah, yeah.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: It's another tier of leadership training that the OTA is offering. So it's a really great organization. Those folks put on a good show. They are great for us year-round.

I also fielded some of the requests about zoning and some of the water complaints, had calls, plenty of calls and emails about the sales tax increase.

I had the opportunity to participate in a Fire Station Project meeting with our owners rep, the architect and the construction team today to sort of iron things out.

Obviously, I am sure it's no surprise to many people to understand that we're looking at an extended, you know, date. There has been plenty of delays and so forth, so we're hashing out the timeline about when it's done. It's more than likely going to be into the summer months before we will see that completed and that's really based on delivery delays and a lot of things that we need to be operational and things that are out of our control, out of the contractor's control.

Have had some ongoing meetings with the LCTA. I was up at the county today meeting with one of our commissioners, one of the other commissioners, to talk about the funding requests that Concord put forth as far as spending ARPA dollars and some infrastructure projects we're going to see get going here. It's going to take some time but we'll be deploying that in the coming year.

So I don't know if it's -- The County Engineer put out a policy today. I know that the townships are trying to work with that as far as mailboxes. So I think it's important to know that it is effective as of the 1st of February that the community ought to know that the county has, the County

Engineer's Office, specifically, has said they will not be repairing damage. So we certainly do expect to be fielding calls and working together. Lake County Township Association is looking to come up with a uniform policy as a response. We haven't got that yet but stay tuned on that. We understand that's going to be an issue for our residents and we're trying to work through a resolution on that.

So with that, I will conclude my report and we will move on into Department Reports, beginning with Administrator Andy Rose.

MR. ROSE: Thank you, Mr. McIntosh. Members of the board, Mr. Teknipp, members of the audience, good evening. Happy Township Day. I will start with some items that are on the agenda.

Item B is a vote to renew the memorandum of understanding between us and Lake Metroparks. This has been a long-standing memorandum of understanding regarding the access point to the Greenway Corridor through the Old Stone School parking lot next to the community garden. It just outlines that we will take care of the parking lot, like we always have, and then they are responsible to take care of the path from the edge of the parking lot to the Greenway Corridor, but because it's on our property we have a memorandum of understanding in place. That MOU has been in place since the Greenway Corridor was established and we refresh it every five years. We have a wonderful relationship with Lake Metroparks, so I would encourage passage of that, of that vote.

Item C is a purchase order, that's to retain a firm to conduct the commissioning services for Fire Station 1.

It's always good to have a third party come in to test all of

the various systems when you're commissioning the station and that's what this does for Fire Station 1.

Item D is a purchase order to Classic Ford, that's for vehicle repairs. Earlier today we acquired a 2017 vehicle, a police SUV from the City of Mentor. It needs a transmission. But after consulting with our Service Director, that's actually an easy fix. And we've reviewed the vehicle and it's in great shape. It's a transmission swap out and it will be under warranty. A comparable vehicle in the used market is running about 17, 18 thousand and we're going to get this for the cost of the transmission and maybe a couple of ticky-tack parts. We're going to use this for Recreation so they don't have to keep using their personal vehicles to come over here and handle all of the events. So this is a very good investment, so I encourage passage of that.

On to some other items, yesterday I was able to visit one of our local manufacturers. We have a small group, it's a member from Team NEO, along with a member of Lake County's Lake Development Authority, and we go out and kind of do a "how goes it" with our manufacturers and yesterday was one of those days. We had good productive dialogue and we talked about, you know, partnering with some of the our local schools to see if that could work out. We talked about some employment challenges, which is a common theme when we go visit these manufacturers is, you know, we're short a number of people. And, you know, we're trying, you know, we try everything, Jobs Ohio, Team NEO has got incentives, but it's tough to get the employees and so we keep striving for that. But the business is doing very well and they are very happy in Concord Township and they're thrilled with the economic

development and the work that we're doing, and they're excited about some of the new projects that will be coming into the township here soon. So all in all, it was a very good visit.

Mr. Dondorfer touched on it but I am working with the Health District to untwist this septic system issue. There are two issues, one is the fee associated with the annual inspection -- that seems to be new -- and then there is one particular resident that's having some difficulty with a neighboring resident regarding a septic system and so we're working through that as well.

Friday, at noon, we will be opening the landscape contract bids. So I am hoping for a favorable result from the landscaping bids and I anticipate that that will be on the agenda at our next meeting on the 15th.

And, finally, just something that I want to start digging into, but based on the passage of Senate Bill 33 during the last legislative session that was signed by the Governor on January 2nd, that particular bill allows home rule townships to establish their own CRA and it -- no offense, Commissioner -- but it cuts the county out of the loop and it cuts the State Department of Development out of the loop and it lets us, you know, chart our own course. So I am going to start crafting some language and I will be talking to the Trustees at office hours and so forth about what we want to see that look like, and then I'll probably work with our distinguished legal counsel in order to make sure that the language is crafted appropriately in accordance with the intent of the bill. That's not something that's going to happen in the next ten minutes but it's something that I think we need to work towards and establish our own CRA as a limited home room rule township. So that's one of the things I've got coming up.

So that concludes my report. Thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thank you, Mr. Rose. I would like to add, too, that we did have a committee meeting yesterday with the JEDD and we talked at length about that. And I think, just to add a little bit of color, I think generally with the amount of growth and economic development we're doing here in Concord, it's a welcome, it's a welcome tool from the legislature.

MR. ROSE: It is.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: That we can be more efficient and we'll take advantage of that. That will definitely help in marketing our community.

Thank you, Mr. Rose.

Moving on, Fire Department, Chief Sabo.

CHIEF SABO: Good evening, everyone.

MR. DONDORFER: Good evening, Chief.

total of 224 incidents in the month of January. We had 148 EMS events, with 126 transports to local hospitals. We had 76 non-EMS, including three fires, all within Concord, one vehicle fire, one stove fire and one structure fire. We gave mutual aid 16 times, received mutual aid 12 times and had 51 overlapping calls, for about almost 23 percent of our calls were overlapping, so more than one event happening at once.

The fire prevention bureau was busy with 40 inspections, accounting for about 60 hours. They did seven plan reviews, for about 12 hours, and completed ten hours of continuing education. They also were out in the schools.

They presented a program on fire service and offered a tour of the fire trucks to 36 children and 20 adults at Hope Ridge for their Cub Scout program, so it was pretty neat to see.

And today we had the opportunity to welcome home a five-year-old Concord resident. He was discharged home from the hospital after a lengthy stay there and we wish him well on his recovery.

So outside of that, Item F on the agenda this evening is a request to increase our EMS billing rates. We've not seen an increase, we've not asked for an increase in a number of years. But this also gives a good opportunity to educate the community on our billing processes, if you don't mind taking a couple minutes just to go over that for the community.

Yes, we do bill for EMS services. So what does that mean? We do, we only bill for EMS services when we transport a patient to the hospital. So it doesn't cost any more for us to show up and do an evaluation. The bill only kicks in when there is an actual transport.

And we do what's called soft billing. Just like many of the fire departments around here, they all do soft billing. And what that means is we bill your insurance company, we accept what your insurance company pays and it's done. We do not balance bill our residents. But that has also led to some questions. Our EMS billing vendor that, the company that takes care of all of this for us, they are out of North Carolina. So once in a while, one of our residents will get a letter from North Carolina representing us. It is legitimate. But I always encourage people, if you don't know, ask. Give us a call and we will be happy to explain what it

is.

If you are transported by Concord Township and you are a Concord Township resident, it's not, it should not be a bill. It should not be asking for a balance of fees. But sometimes -- Most of the time we try to get a signature from the patient authorizing us to bill their insurance. Sometimes that's just not feasible and so we have to send, our billing company has to send a letter to the resident asking for that signature authorizing us to bill their insurance.

Nonresidents, billing takes place quite the same way. We bill their insurance. We accept what their insurance pays and, but the only difference is we do ask the nonresident to pay the balance that's not covered by insurance.

So that also leads to questions. What hospitals do we transport to? So, typically, we transport to UH Geauga, UH TriPoint, UH Lake West -- I am still trying to get used to same it that way -- but, and Cleveland Clinic Hillcrest and, very soon, Cleveland Clinic Mentor. So we don't, we are not always able to meet those requests. A lot of it comes down to medical necessities. Some of those hospitals cannot accept the patients the way they're presenting. But our firefighters, our paramedics are very well versed at which hospitals can accept and we're always staying updated on which hospitals are busy.

Right now, there are some hospitals that if we transport a patient to, sometimes the EMS crew is waiting up to two hours just to transfer that patient to the emergency room, so that becomes very difficult for us to continue to provide service in our township. So when we get word of that, we have to make some changes in our transport policy.

We will not transport downtown to Cleveland Clinic or UH main campus unless it's medically necessary, and that's a very limited number of opportunities for us to actually consider transporting downtown but we will in those circumstances when it's the right thing to do for that patient.

three different billing rates. So you have the basic life support rate; the advanced life support level 1, which is just hooking somebody up to a monitor and keeping an eye on them; and then there is advanced life support level 2, which is more for critical patients, cardiac arrests, strokes. And it's based on number of interventions. That's what triggers a Level 2. And then we also bill per mile. So the mileage from the time we pick the patient up to the time we get them to the hospital, whatever that mileage is, that's what we use to record to the billing company.

Do you have any questions about that?

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: I just, I know we talked about this the other day in staff meeting but I want to again. When you presented these numbers, we're not in line with most of the communities and this adjustment would put us more in? We wouldn't be the highest, we're not the lowest, we are kind of in that middle part.

CHIEF SABO: Correct.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: This is just keeping up pace with the cost of things and where we are in our community.

CHIEF SABO: Correct, yeah. So it's not putting us over the top but it does bring us out of a hole and keep us from falling behind. Fuel is increasingly getting more

expensive for everybody and we're no different. So we need to make some judgments in terms of the mileage rates and, like you said, yeah, just staying in line with the rest of the area fire departments and EMS agencies. We looked at Lake County, Geauga County and Ashtabula County as far as a rate comparison and this puts us really close to average.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Okay, great.

MS. LUCCI: Chief, our current charges have been in place for how long?

CHIEF SABO: At least since 2016 when I became chief and we switched EMS billing companies. I don't recall what the rates were before I became chief but I think there was a slight increase in that but I just don't remember. But at least 2016, we have not made an adjustment since then.

MS. LUCCI: Thank you.

CHIEF SABO: You bet. Thank you very much.

MR. DONDORFER: Thanks, Chief.

MR. ROSE: Thanks, Chief.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Service Department, Mr. Brown.

MR. BROWN: Good evening, everyone.

MR. ROSE: Good evening.

MR. BROWN: The Service Department in the month of January responded to 12 callouts for snow and ice conditions and applied approximately 640 tons of salt to the roadways. Our crews continue to perform road evaluations for the upcoming construction season. Pothole patching, mailbox repairs and snow barricade installs, along with drainage area checks throughout the township, are some of the other duties performed in the Service Department.

Our equipment maintenance crew has been busy

maintaining the plow fleet with some minor repairs and preventative maintenance.

Crews also responded to flooding complaints during the heavy rain events and the majority of the issues were due to the volume of rain that fell in a short period. The storm systems were taking everything that they could handle, therefore caused a little bit of flooding throughout the township. Working alongside the Lake County Stormwater Department, the Service Department made several site visits to inspect areas for maintenance and improvements to drainage within the township.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Zoning Department, Heather Freeman.

MS. FREEMAN: Good evening.

MR. ROSE: Good evening.

MR. DONDORFER: Good evening.

MS. FREEMAN: Happy Ohio Township Day.

MR. ROSE: You, too.

MS. FREEMAN: During the month of January, the Zoning Department staff processed 13 zoning permit applications and collected \$1,750 in fees. Additionally, we issued 25 zoning certificate of compliances, and Zoning staff also received and followed up on four new complaints about

potential zoning violations.

As far as the zoning board activity during the month of January, the Zoning Commission conditionally approved an amended site plan for that ice cream parlor and car wash that's going to be going in on Crile Road. And, also, the BZA approved one variance application for a resident that lives over on Arias Way for the location of an accessory building that they wanted to put on their property.

Last week I attended the Ohio Township Winter

Conference in Columbus, attended a few great sessions. They
had some very specific zoning topics tailored directly towards
townships, and I look forward to being able to bring back some
of those ideas and some of those new things that I heard from
other townships in Ohio. And I just want to thank the

Trustees for always supporting staff and allowing us to attend
and focus on our continuing education. I really appreciate
that.

MR. DONDORFER: Thank you.

MR. ROSE: Thanks, Heather.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Recreation, Sean, welcome.

MR. SUPLER: Hello. Good evening, everyone. Just want to go over a few events that we have coming up here currently ongoing.

Our annual Concord Township Photo Contest is currently ongoing. Entries are being accepted until February 28th. Participants can enter two photos per category. And those categories include: nature, places, people, black and white photos, and unique Concord sites. Online voting is going to be taking place from March 6th to the 24th and the winners will be announced on the 27th. If

anybody has issues entering their or submitting their photos online at ConcordTwp.com, the Recreation Department and staff can help you out with that. Just call (440) 639-4650 and we can help you out submitting those photos.

The American Red Cross blood drive is coming up on Friday, February 24th, from 10:00 to 3:00 and that is held at the Community Center.

We have a lot of great classes currently ongoing: yoga classes, Pilates, marshal arts. We're doing some cooking classes right now called Let's Cook which have been very well attended so far.

February is Heart Healthy month, Black History Month and the Super Bowl, and we are doing some senior socials to celebrate all those events. February 1st, which was today, was Dr. Paul Zellers, from UH, did a lecture on having a healthy heart, which was very well attended. February 8th, Dennis Sutcliffe is a popular speaker who's going to be talking about Jane Russell and Cleveland's forgotten champions right before the Super Bowl. February 15th is Susan Cannavino, she is with Pizzaz Entertainment and she is doing The Extraordinary Life of Dr. Martin Luther King. And then the last event is February 22nd, that's our monthly bingo with a heart theme.

The community gardens are currently completely full, which is great. We were able to get in six new Concord residents for this year and everyone is very excited and ready for the spring weather, as I am sure everyone here is looking forward to that as well.

Just to follow up on Mrs. Lucci's report here on the Stone School, Dan gave me a little report as well. As she

indicated, there was 365 visitors there this year or, sorry, 2022. They had 13 total events on site, there was eight total bus tours through there, and that 365 was their highest that they've had since they have been keeping records. So that's good for them. So, yeah, Dan is a great guy, as you guys all know, and very knowledgeable and he does a great job over there. So I'm looking forward to really working with him a little bit more and developing some programming there as well.

And then, lastly, everyone should have received their E-Grapevine. I'm really trying to encourage everyone to sign up for that, as we're going to be working on a lot of new programming and that's going to be the quickest way for our residents to get notified on all that. I would say the next Grapevine won't come out until, I believe, May. So, and also to follow the Rec Department on all their social medias as well because, like I said, we are hard at work and developing all these new programming that's going to be coming out starting in the spring and stuff in the summer as well. So, again, just follow us on social media so we can help you out getting signed up for all of those. Again, call the Rec Department, 639-4650.

And that concludes by report.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thanks, Sean.

MR. DONDORFER: Nice work.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: I know Sean's had a lot of work. He just started with us this year. It's great to have him.

MS. LUCCI: Yes.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: I know, I think, as you said,

Dan Maxson does a fantastic job there and we are lucky to have

him. He really is knowledgeable. I noticed that a lot last

year in '22. His knowledge of township history is quite deep.

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With that, we will move on to Sheriff, Concord law enforcement, and tonight we have Captain Paterson here to give the report. I guess you let Sergeant Infalvi have a vacation?

CAPTAIN PATERSON: Yeah, he had the nerve to take a vacation on us.

MR. DONDORFER: Thanks for being here.

CAPTAIN PATERSON: Thank you. Good evening, all. For the month of January, your Sheriff's Office handled a total of 1,072 calls for service. As far as accidents, I went through a few of these here. Accidents handled, we handled two injury accidents, we handled a total of 13 property damage related accidents. We had two arrests that involved out-of-county residents. We had an arrest of an adult female from Euclid. She was arrested for disorderly conduct over at the Comfort Inn on January 10th. On January 19th, we had an arrest of an adult male from Cleveland. This was a result of a traffic stop. At first, the male didn't pull over. further north on Chestnut from State Route 84, deputies did make a traffic stop and the male had possessed a fully loaded firearm, along with marijuana. That is a violation of the constitutional carry law for having those items together. So he was charged on multiple felony charges and arrested for that.

We had about four warrant arrests in Concord. We had 23 citations and 135 written warnings. We were able to get pretty proactive with our traffic enforcement this month, which was good to see. We also concentrated on some areas of some complaints on traffic, which were Girdled Road, Mardon Drive, and I believe there was another one here. We were

centered on Hunting Lake, the new portion of Hunting Lake Drive.

MR. ROSE: Yeah.

CAPTAIN PATERSON: So we will continue to do that, continue those efforts into February. I am thinking the speed trailer is something we can -- maybe touch and go, depending upon the weather, and we want the right locations for those off the roadway but that's something we can probably begin to plan for.

We had disabled vehicle assists, we had 30. In addition to that, we covered 11 lockouts for assists to the public, responded to five disturbances. We had two DOAs, four domestic violence cases. Drug investigations and/or complaints, we had three, Auburn Road, Alexander and Crile. Ten harassment/threats type natured reports. We responded to -- excuse me -- two neighbor complaints on Majesty Lane. We had -- I am sorry. We had a stolen skid steer from Concord Motor Sports, 12 additional thefts beyond that. Twenty-two traffic complaints were fielded. We had three weapons complaints, one on I-90, one on Auburn Road, one on Melridge. And we responded to 17 welfare checks.

I would like to make a couple points that might be helpful for the community. We, on our phone app for the Sheriff's Office phone app, we actually added some new links, one is for missing pets and another one is to gain access to your accident reports through the state. So those may be pretty helpful.

And, also, I'd like to point out, I believe it was last week we did, the Sheriff put out a press release regarding defensive driving and I would encourage all to take

a look at that. It was posted on the website and on Facebook. 1 It offers a lot of good tips. Obviously, it's the time of 2 year where we want to make sure we can offer the best safety 3 suggestions as possible. We had a slight climb in accidents this past month, seen more than other townships. But, again, 5 just so we can kind of keep everybody driving cautiously. 6 And that's about all, concludes the report. 7 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thank you. 8 MS. LUCCI: Thank you. 9 10 MR. DONDORFER: Thank you. MR. ROSE: Thanks. 11 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: I think it's ironic that he 12 mentioned the app when we were talking about it right as the 13 meeting started. I love it. It's fantastic. 14 MR. ROSE: Yeah, it's great. 15 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: And at the very least, if you 16 have it, turn your notifications on. You can find out when 17 the roads are closed. 18 19 MR. DONDORFER: Right. 20 MS. LUCCI: Right. 21 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: I highly recommend that you get 22 it if you haven't. 23 Moving on, Audience Portion, anyone from the 24 audience? Commissioner Regovich. 25 MR. REGOVICH: So I wasn't going to speak tonight to 26 make the meeting longer. MR. DONDORFER: That's fine. 27 28 MR. REGOVICH: I thought I'd hear the Law Director give a report. It will take me back in time. 29 30 Just to touch on what Andy was saying, I actually

made some phone calls today for workforce development. We realize that all these companies need workers. So I have something I would like to start going countywide and, literally, produce workers out of our high schools. Those kids that aren't going to college or maybe not, don't know the path yet, we want to get to them early. So I am reaching out to the school systems, I am reaching out the businesses, I am reaching out to Lakeland Community College, Auburn Career Center to get these things moving and get these kids, even in school, a taste of maybe what they want to do or don't want to do but give them the expectation that, boy, we want you to go to work when you graduate high school if you are not going to go to college or if you do not have a plan and we can get you a good wage and a good -- as long as you are willing to work hard.

So I am probably going to be reaching out to the County Administrator here and, you know, get their feedback and start getting into some of these businesses and see how they can do it. We have seen it happening on a smaller basis. Businesses got together at AWT, things like that. I just want to coordinate that effort and maybe, you know, make it countywide so that we can use it throughout the county.

MR. DONDORFER: Great.

MR. REGOVICH: So that's something I am starting to push forward now that I don't have to deal with the other issue I already dealt with.

MR. DONDORFER: Thank you very much.

MS. LUCCI: All right. Yeah, thank you.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Good information, great news.

MS. LUCCI: Good information.

MR. ROSE: That's very good to hear. 1 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Anybody else? 2 (No response.) 3 I think that concludes the audience. Moving on to Old Business, of which there is none, 5 which brings us to our New Business. 6 As mentioned earlier by our Fiscal Officer, we will 7 be tabling the January financial reports to the February 15th 8 meeting, so that will move us to on to Item B for the MOU 9 10 between us and Lake Metroparks. MS. LUCCI: Mr. Chairman, I move that we approve the 11 12 MOU between the Lake Metroparks District and Concord Township. MR. DONDORFER: I will second. 13 14 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: All right. Is there any discussion? 15 MS. LUCCI: No. 16 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Okay. Hearing none, all in 17 favor? 18 19 (Three aye votes, no nay votes.) 20 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: The motion passes with three 21 ayes. Next. 22 MR. DONDORFER: Mr. Chairman, I make a motion to 23 approve the P.O. to Integrated Engineering Consultants 24 Incorporated for Fire Station Number 1 commissioning services 25 in the amount of \$9,400. 26 MS. LUCCI: I will second. 27 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Any discussion? 28 MR. DONDORFER: No. I think, you know, 29 Administrator Rose hit on it. I mean, it's important that we, 30 I think, we have a third party to come in and test all the

systems. And, you know, a large investment in Station 1, so I 1 think it's needed. 2 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: It's nice to be talking about 3 commissioning the fire station. MS. LUCCI: Yes. 5 MR. ROSE: Yes, it is. 6 7 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Do I have a second? Oh, you second. I am sorry. 8 MS. LUCCI: I'll second. 9 10 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Second, okay. We did that already. 11 12 MS. LUCCI: Yeah, I think so. CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Sorry. All in favor? Any 13 opposed? 14 None. MS. LUCCI: None. 15 (Three aye votes, no nay votes.) 16 CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Okay. 17 18 MS. LUCCI: All right. Mrs. Lucci moved to approve the policy change, Mr. Dondorfer seconded and it passed with three ayes. And Future Meetings and Announcements. MR. TEKNIPP: On February 7th, at 7:00 p.m., there will be a Zoning Commission meeting at Town Hall. On February 8th, at 7:00 p.m., the BZA meeting will hold a meeting at Town Hall. And on February 15th, at 6:30 p.m., at Town Hall conference room, there will be trustee office hours; and at 7:30 p.m., following the trustees office hours, there will be a trustees meeting at Town Hall. Again, that will be at 7:30 on February 15th. CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Okay, all right. Thank you. And with that, we will conclude our February 1st meeting. MR. DONDORFER: Good evening. MS. LUCCI: Thank you. (Whereupon, the meeting was adjourned at 8:18 p.m.)
