

Our full time staffing underwent significant change in 2022 as we adjusted to an Officer retirement and subsequent promotions to fill open positions. The fire service, similar to other industries, is facing manpower shortages. In 2022 the Township evaluated staffing needs and current employment trends and took action by establishing 3 additional full time positions. These 3 positions were filled from an established eligibility list by firefighters who had been working part time for Concord Township.

On June 16 Deputy Fire Chief Ron Terriaco retired after serving 40 years with the fire department.

Deputy Chief Terriaco joined Concord Fire in 1982 as a part time firefighter. Over the years, he advanced through the ranks, becoming Deputy Fire Chief in 2009.

As he moved upward in rank, Deputy Chief Terriaco continually advocated for advanced training not only for himself and fellow Concord Township firefighters but for the overall public safety community.

Lieutenant Calhoun is in charge of the initial new hire process and Lieutenant Yoder works with the newly hired firefighters throughout their orientation and probationary periods.

In 2022 we participated in 4 recruitment events including Auburn Career Center's Career Day and Auburn's mock interviews.

Our orientation process was changed to two 8 hours days. Following orientation, the probationary firefighter completes 48 hours on shift, before they are able to be considered as staffing, yet only 1 probationary firefighter maybe scheduled at each station.

Lt. Brainard is in charge of scheduling. Our combination of full time and part time firefighters has created an effective mix for Concord Township for many years. However, Concord Township has not been immune to staffing shortages and scheduling continued to be a challenge in 2022. We hired 6 new part time firefighters in 2022. However, we had 6 part time firefighters resign, all related to full time employment with other departments. Our minimum staffing continues to be 8 per 24 hour shift. The ability to utilize probationary firefighters for minimum staffing purposes has decreased overtime to a degree. We currently have two members who fill the Firefighter 1 position, which is an assigned schedule on a specific 24 hour shift. We hope to fill four more Firefighter 1 positions in 2023 which would assist with filling shifts and reducing overtime.

With the retirement of Deputy Fire Chief Terriaco in June the department promoted from within to fill the open positions of deputy fire chief and also the subsequent open positions of 1 captain, 1 lieutenant and 1 full time firefighter. With long term planning for the future of the department in mind, 3 additional full time firefighter positions were created in 2022. The open officer and full time positions were all filled with candidates from the established promotional lists.

Training

LT. Wallace Brainard

Training Officer

Much of our training in 2022 focused on preparing our new hires to become acclimated to our department and proficient in the skills required to complete our probationary testing and become regular status firefighters.

We had several EMT/Basics attending paramedic school in 2022 and we all honed our EMS skills as we coached them in their studies. In addition, our Medical Director, Dr Garlisi and UH EMS training instructors provided in house EMS trainings to each shift monthly. Dr. Garlisi also provided in house classroom and hands on training on RSI – Rapid Sequence Intubation. This intervention will be implemented in 2023 and expands our medical abilities.

Additional in house trainings in 2022 included rope/tech rescue. Two firefighters were able to attend live burn training at Munson Fire. One firefighter became recertified as a Child Safety Seat Technician.

We had members attend courses in person and hybrid through Auburn Career Center, Bowling Green State University and Akron University to become Fire Inspectors, Fire Investigators and Fire Officers. Our current fire inspectors kept up with their skills by attending the Northeast Ohio Arson Seminar.

Quartermaster

Lt. Wallace Brainard



In 2022 we changed gear manufacturer to Lion. We choose specifications for the gear that would require less maintenance and provide more protection for our firefighters. The gear has magnetic closures and the inner liner is attached to the outliner with a zipper. These two changes should be more effective at keeping contaminates out of the gear. The thermal layer was changed to a material that dries faster helping us reduce down time when we clean the gear.

The price of duty clothing and turn out gear has jumped dramatically. Additional monies were spent in 2022 due to the hiring of new part time and full time firefighters and officer promotions. Daily duty clothing, turn out gear, Class A uniforms and ballistic vests are all portions of the quartermaster's budget. Daily duty clothing for a new hire is approximately \$450.00; a new set of turn out gear, helmet, hood and gloves approximately \$4,800.

In 2022 we started using rental turn out gear. We are currently renting 4 sets of gear for new members, which lowers the cost of outfitting a new hire. Once new hires have established themselves we will evaluate purchasing their own sets of gear.



In 2022, plans continued for new Station 1 fitness/training room. Equipment from the existing Station 1 will be moved into the new station. A few pieces of updated equipment, both new and used, was purchased to outfit the expanded training space. Firefighter Gigliotti has renewed his certifications as a personal training coach and added courses on nutrition. His experience and trainings provides firefighters support in developing and practicing personalized training programs with nutritional education and proper use of all equipment. His goal includes teaching healthy lifestyles so our firefighters remain healthy and do not become a statistic.

Ladders/Meters Jesse Selby, Firefighter/Paramedic



Ladder testing involves supporting 500 pounds for 5 minutes

In 2022 all ladders passed inspection and testing. No ladders are expected to be out of service due to wear and no replacement ladders are to be expected in 2023

All meters are in good working condition and not expected to need replacement. One 4-gas meter was sent in for warranty repair and is now in good working condition.

One Scott thermal imager was sent in for repair for a bad screen. Our imagers are in good working condition, but are starting to age. Consideration for replacement should be made within the next few years. Replacement cost per thermal imager is approximately \$3,000.

Communications

Adam White Firefighter/Paramedic



The department's oldest computers, used by our fire inspectors were replaced in 2022. Large TV's to be used as monitors were purchased for the fire inspectors, as most blueprints and building preplans are now delivered digitally. To aid in the accuracy of reporting, 2nd monitors were installed at workstations which allows reference information to be displayed on 1 screen while reports are entered on the second.

1 portable radio and 10 batteries were purchased in 2022. We actively seek alternative funding for radios. In 2022 we applied for funding from a FEMA regional grant and from the State of Ohio. Unfortunately we were not awarded either grant.

Active 911 (paging) continues to work well for the department. New dispatching software was built and implemented over many months.

Hose

In 2022, all hose testing was completed in compliance with NFPA 1962. All of our hose passed testing. New crossways were placed into service on frontline apparatus, including new 2 1/4 apartment packs. A section of new hose failed testing following a fire and was warrantied and replaced.

Special Teams





Rope Rescue/USAR Lieutenant Mike Fearing, Firefighter/Paramedic

To meet the needs of our community, it is essential for firefighters to be efficient in rope rescue and special rescue techniques. Lt. Fearing has been instrumental in keeping Concord's firefighters adequately trained in rope and special rescue techniques. In house rope rescue training in 2022 included classroom practice with knots, ropes and hands on use of various hauling systems. In 2022 rope rescue and the special rescue XUV were used for falls into ravines in addition to rescue and transports from the Lake Metroparks Greenway Corridor and hiking trails within the parks. In 2022, Lt. Fearing also began working towards the re-establishment of a Lake County wide special rescue team. A training was held in the fall for eastern Lake County Fire Departments. Lieutenant Fearing, continues to be a member of Ohio Region 2 USAR. There were no USAR call outs during 2022.

Bomb Squad Medic Luigi Ianiro, Firefighter/Paramedic

Tactical emergency medical training prepares our bomb squad medic to provide advanced level of care at a trauma and active violence scenes. Firefighter laniro attended monthly trainings as a member of the Lake County Bomb Squad. Training topics included device recognition and disposal, new trends and threats to high profile targets such as info structure, major business and health care facilities. In 2022, Firefighter laniro provided medical support to the Bomb Squad 7 times, working with multiple agencies and in multiple jurisdictions.

SWAT Medic Adam White, Firefighter/Paramedic

Firefighter Adam White was moved to Medical Team Leader and was given the go ahead to add more Medics to the team. By the end of 2022, the SWAT team bolstered its ranks from 1 to 4 Tactical Medics, adding Medics from LCSO, Painesville Twp Fire Department, and Perry Joint Fire District. This greatly improves the availability of getting more medical response to a callout. FF White participated in 3 high risk warrant services and 1 barricaded suspect.

Captain Mike Homovec Firefighter/Paramedic

A large portion of our vehicle maintenance is completed by Captain Homovec, at a cost savings to the Township. As we wait for the completion of the new fire station, Captain Homovec utilized the Service Department's vehicle bays to work on the vehicles.




Transports & Non Transports 2020-2022

EMS Incidents by Location 2020 - 2022



Levels of Service 2020 - 2022














Incident Location 2020-2022



Motor Vehicle Accidents by Location 2020-2022








Fire Prevention and Education

The members of the Concord Township Fire Department's Fire Prevention and Education Bureau bring a wide range of experience and education to our Township. Our team utilizes its diverse background in efforts to provide outstanding customer service to our community. Deputy Chief Mike Biddell has over 20 years of experience as Concord Firefighter/Paramedic. He also is a State of Ohio Fire Safety Inspector, Fire Instructor, Live Fire instructor, EMS CE Instructor, AHA BLS Instructor, and has an MBA. Inspector and educator Doug Rought has over 40 years of experience in the fire service and fire inspections. He is a State of Ohio Fire Safety Inspector, Fire Instructor, Live Fire instructor, EMS Instructor, AHA BLS Instructor, Red Cross Instructor, Fire Investigator Technician(FIT), and Fire Safety Inspector Instructor. Inspector Brien Spangenberg has over 25 years as firefighter/Medic. He is a State of Ohio Fire Safety Inspector, and Fire investigator with over 20 years' experience.

A key to the success of our prevention bureau is the relationships built with the team members of the Concord Township Zoning Department, Lake County Building Department, Ohio State Fire Marshal's Office along with architects, developers and builders. Of the 635 inspections completed in 2022, approximately 48 were joint inspections with other agencies.

Elements of Fire Prevention

Inspections

Our department completed 635 fire and life safety inspections in 2022. All code compliance issues have been mitigated with a comprehensive, business-friendly attitude, seeking the most efficient and cost – effective methods for compliance.

Education

Community outreach and education is one of the primary goals of our fire department. In 2022, we provided residents and businesses with AHA Heartsaver CPR/AED and 1st Aid training. To expand educational opportunities for our community, we became a Red Cross approved training site. Our team members are always focused on developing safety plans and working with businesses to provide a safe workplace.

Engineering

In 2022, we completed 60 plan reviews of new and existing building projects. We also review and provide feedback on life safety protection systems.

Our focus is to collaborate with stakeholders early in project development and complete the process with an on-site inspection in attempt to provide a safe place for business within our community


Fire Prevention and Education Engineering

Along with Concord Zoning Department and the Lake County Building Department, Fire Prevention reviews new construction plans and remodeling of commercial and public buildings.

Fire Prevention also provides code interpretations to architects, developers, and to the public in order to manage engineering issues before they hit the design phase of their project.

Our inspectors provide guidance to code builders on fire adherence throughout the construction planning review process. Some of the larger projects in 2022 include remodeling at Ranpak, UH Tripoint, and Cometic Gasket and new building at Auburn Career Center (Fire Training Facility), Steven Douglas Corporation and the new Concord Fire Station #1.






Fire Prevention and Education Inspections

Concord Fire Department follows the suggestions of the Ohio Fire Code by sending a representative to commercial and educational organizations for their annual inspections. During an inspection we review the safety components of the building. Our inspectors are checking the sprinkler systems, fire alarms, fire extinguishers, means of egress, cooking protection systems, and wiring are just some of the things reviewed during each inspection. Also, upon request residents can get a home inspection to assist with any adoption or foster home parenting.

Fire Prevention and Education Fire Investigations

Investigating fire scenes for cause and origin is an essential aspect of a fire prevention bureau. Training in fire investigation enables our firefighters to complete internal fire investigations, identify signs of arson, provides a deeper awareness of cause and origins of fire and heightens scene awareness – all which assists with suppression efforts and scene preservation.

Along with Concord Township's Fire Inspectors and Fire Chief, the department now has 6 members trained as investigators. In 2022 Firefighter Lerman and Firefighter Sheppard completed training to become fire investigators.

Along with being members of the departments own Fire Investigative Unit (FIU), investigators may also serve on the East End Lake County Fire Investigation Unit. The East End Lake County FIU team meets monthly for classroom and hands on trainings. Joint trainings with the West End Lake County FIU team are held 1-2 times a year. An FIU team call out is activated by the department with jurisdiction over a fire scene. In 2022, our department's investigator in 16 fire investigations, participated including 6 in Concord Township, 4 in Madison, 3 in Painesville Township, 1 in Fairport, 1 in Leroy and 1 in Painesville City.

Fire investigators require continuous training to keep up with evolving trends in building structure and materials and the fire codes. In December 2022, several members attended a regional arson seminar. Our inspectors are also members of the North Eastern Ohio Fire Prevention Association, the Northeast Ohio Safety Educators Network and the International Association of Arson Investigators.

In 2022 we returned to providing educational programs in the schools. The school program was delivered in person to St. Gabriel, Melridge Elementary, Hope Ridge Preschool, Painesville Christian Academy, St. Gabriel's Learning Loft, Parkside, Goddard School and Hershey Montessori.



In addition, we provided a virtual program for 700 Lamuth Middle school students using NPA programing provided by the Ohio Fire Marshalls office. The program was posted on the schools website and included home exit drills and practice drills. 190 Lamuth Middle Schools 6th graders explored careers in the fire service in addition to learning fire safety.
