- As of August 31st we're 67 percent of
- 7 the way through the year. The treasury
- 8 balance for 21 active funds within the
- 9 Township treasury was \$10,357.
- 10 The treasury balance includes 2.6
- 11 million in funds set aside for special
- 12 specific projects.
- Year to date, expenditures were 67
- percent of the amount appropriated for the
- 15 year 2023. The revenue received year to date
- is 94 percent, including the second half real
- 17 estate tax settlements. These are about 6
- 18 percent greater than the projected for the
- 19 settlements. So, as you can see, we are
- within budget.
- On tonight's agenda I have a couple of
- 22 housekeeping items there. There are two
- 23 Resolutions. I ask that the Trustees
- favorably approve Resolution 2023-19 for the
- 25 2024 street lighting assessment.

1	Then the second Resolution is 2023-22.
2	This is accepting the amounts and rates
3	determined by the Budget Commission and
4	authorizing the necessary tax levies and
5	certifying them to the auditor. This is the
6	final step of the tax budget that we worked on
7	a couple months ago.
8	If you have any specific financial
9	questions, please do not hesitate to call our
10	office at 354-7516. That's my report for this
11	evening.
12	CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thank you,
13	Mr. Teknipp.
14	Trustees. Mrs. Lucci.
15	MRS. LUCCI: Thank you,
16	Mr. Chairman. It's a been a while since our
17	last meeting. It's great to be back. Lots
18	happened over the last month. We have a lot
19	more things to look forward to.
20	First our Community Day was a huge
21	success. The parade, the bands, the food.
22	Everyone who donated to the raffle baskets, of
23	course the fireworks. Thank you to everyone
24	who pulled this off. Especially Sean, our Rec
25	Director and his staff. The pancake breakfast

was great. The Service Department and Fire

Department, and law enforcement for keeping us

all safe.

We look forward to the rest of the events this year I'm sure Sean will mention in his report.

Earlier in August we had a visit from our Congressman Dave Joyce, who toured our new fire station. He was very interested and impressed with a lot of the safety features for the fire service people, training facilities and the overall build. It was a very good visit. We enjoyed it and thank him for his time coming out.

We continue to await the completion of our station. We've had some usual bumps and delays, and hopefully we have a ribbon cutting announcement very soon.

We had a tornado and then a nearby earthquake the following day. We were made aware of some of the damage by residents from our Service Department. Mostly downed trees and some

downed power lines. We had some residents
reach out that had no power. We did contact
our First Energy liaison who helped us
understand what those -- how those energy
issues were being resolved. We appreciate
everyone's patience for that as well.
Hopefully the weather doesn't get too much
more crazy before Winter.

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School is back in session. Reminder to be mindful of the children waiting at the bus stops, and slow down.

And we were just talking about the Riverside/Mentor game last week, which was phenomenal. Riverside beat Mentor, two of our high schools. The last time Riverside beat Mentor was 1961. Believe it or not. That was a huge deal. It was a packed house.

We are finally seeing some action on the development of a new ice cream shop and car wash. I get so many questions on when is the ice cream store coming. So hopefully next year we can make that happen.

It was a great event. Despite some bad 23 weather at the onset, we made it through and 2.4 it was a great event. Sean did a great job, 25 his staff. It was great. Great evening, so 1 thank you.

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I hope everybody enjoyed their Labor

Day. It has been a while since we met. We

did get some updates on the fire station

recently. We're hoping to be able to

commission that building in the very near

future. It looks great over there, despite

some setbacks and challenges. We're excited

about it.

Since we last met I did get some questions or some calls from some residents.

One regarding the Safety Services levy. I know we're going to have some future discussion on that at future stakeholder meetings.

Did have a call regarding a traffic concern in the Mountain Park area. We're working with that resident resolving some concerns that they have in that area.

Again, with the bad weather that came in, it was -- I haven't seen weather like that in Lake County in -- that I can remember. Especially with that many tornadoes confirmed touchdown in the area.

There were a lot of people that reached

emails that had some concerns about, you know, when their power was going to be restored, and how it was going to be resolved, and rolled out. I explained to some residents that I talked to that it was, you know, a pretty catastrophic event. There was a lot of damage throughout not only Concord Township but throughout Lake County. I saw, just in my job as a first responder, I mean the west end of the county was pretty substantially hit, Willoughby Hills, Waite Hill, and Willoughby. It was labor intensive. I explained it was a lot of people that had to wait and be patient.

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We worked with our liaison at First
Energy to see, keep our residents informed on,
you know, updated on when the services were
going to be back, or expected to be back. I'm
sure we're going to have some discussions,
round table after to see how things could be
improved. I thought overall First Energy did
a good job. There was a lot of energy
companies from Pennsylvania, New Jersey, a lot
of other states that I saw staged in different
areas throughout the county to respond, to get

power restored. I thought for the most part

everybody did a good job with that.

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Thank you to our Service Department,
you know, as far as going out in those areas
of Concord Township that were really impacted
from the storms. Morely Hills, Weathersfield,
we went out, the Trustees drove around, looked
at those areas that were impacted and worked
with Service Director Tim Brown in getting
some help to those residents, and getting
their brush collected and things of that
nature. Sort of help them out with the burden
they had after cleanup of the storm. Thank
you to the Service Department.

With that I also would like to extend my condolences to Mr. McIntosh on the loss of your mother. I know it's a tough thing.

Thank you. That's all I have.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: It has been -feels strange to be back. It's been a month.

It sounds like -- I've been pretty busy, and
it sounds like we all have been.

Community Day was great. It was the parade was fun to have that back. We had a lot of people turn out. Kind of saw the stage

and didn't see, but then you turned the corner

and everyone was there. It was great. I

think we got a lot of positive feedback about

having it. I think that was really nice.

5 Saw a lot of the new things.

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Unfortunately we got that little blip of rain that I think slowed people from showing up. I just wanted to take -- first I wanted to say thank you again, huge thank you to the Recreation Department. We showed up here early and it was raining, and we were kind of pushing things off.

The one thing that, as I think about that day I reflect, 100 percent all of the time, no matter what is going on at these events, the Recreation staff is running around, not only running around making sure, they are running around with smiles on their faces. They are having a great time. They put all their energy into it. I just am so proud of that department and staff that put so much, give so much to the community to make these events great.

So, we have a lot of great, not to say -- all our department are fantastic --

they put so much energy. It's raining, they
are like it's going to be great. We're happy.
We're so excited. I am like there is nothing

that weathers them down. So it was awesome.

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Because it was raining we didn't really have a big turn out for the presentation of the Citizen of the Year. I would like to take a minute really say, Mr. Jim Rowe, over 50 year resident of Concord Township, served 44 years on the Zoning Commission and received this honor at the age of 89 years old. family was here. To sit on the Zoning Boards and do that work for that long, it's kind of thankless and goes unnoticed. But there is a lot of things to it. The smile on his face, the picture of all of us giving him that award, admiration of his family really was nice to see that. But I mean I think it was so deserving in the sense that someone puts that much into the community. So I kind of wanted to say that on the record since people didn't get a chance to see that presentation and hear what we had to say about Jim.

Did get a couple calls from residents, lots of calls and emails about the storm

cleanup and the electricity. I know there is
a lot of questions with respect to First

Energy and how their response was. That's
something that we will kind of go through the
process here discussing it.

Did get a call regarding a BZA hearing.

Just kind your regular stuff.

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I know we talked a little bit about the Local Government Fund. That's the thing that Prosecutor Coulson is saying is invalid and there is going to have to be some work.

Myself, Mr. Tim Brown administrator of Madison Township and Chuck Hillier from Painesville Township are now part of the ad hoc committee that is going to start working on that. Just wanted to let everyone know I'm pretty engaged with that. We will be working, and obviously thinking about Concord Township but also all the townships. Very early in the process definitely still sorting out what this is going to look like, but we're engaged in that project.

Along with Mrs. Lucci, got to tour the fire station with Congressman Joyce. It was really nice to see his energy and enthusiasm.

And I know that that visit was in part because 1 2 Mr. Rose is eyeing some federal legislation that might be something that could help us 3 with future projects and whatever, had the forethought to invite the Congressman to come 5 6 out and see what, when it opens, we will be the most safety conscious, high-tech, 7 8 state-of-the-art fire station in all of Lake 9 County. Something Concord Township residents 10 should be proud of. He was very receptive to 11 It was a very good use of our time with 12 him. We do thank him for taking the time to 1.3 come see us.

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Did have a few questions about the safety levy and I think we will be scheduling a stakeholder meeting soon. The fire station project, we're hoping to see that wrap up this month maybe, we'll see.

I did have some time, I did also spend some time working on zoning, a little of economic development. Met with some commercial developers talking about some of the land in the township they are trying to sell. Also talked with one of the residential developers about some property they are

1 looking to do a couple different projects

with, both commercial and some residential.

3 That is all still going on.

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Received a few questions about Quail Hollow. Some rumors floating around about what's going on with the hotel and the golf course. As of now, we don't know of anything formally happening. If you hear any chatter, it's just that, chatter.

Just to close up on the zoning topic, I did have the opportunity to be in the zoning office Friday last, was going through some things, and Ms. Freeman and I popped out the first official zoning map of Concord Township that was signed in September of 1965.

Pursuant to that, I ended up having a discussion about the ice cream/car wash opening on social media. There were a couple of begrudging comments about Lake County turning into Mentor and whatnot.

1965 set in place most of the zoning for Concord Township. So all of your residential zoning, and all of those plots, that was decided back then. Back then that little area of land was all designated

1 basically to be business.

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One of our zoning districts is now called business interchange, PX district, the interchange was the classification of zoning there.

I will say, over that period of time
the township has pivoted away from
manufacturing to be a little bit more oriented
to retail and service, which seems to be more
in line of what Concord Township wants.

When you think about what manufacturing can be, you can look at certain segments of Tyler Boulevard in Mentor and I would argue that over the last 40 years we've made a constructive improvement to our zoning for more serviceable and better aesthetics for our community. We just want residents to understand that the development of that district in commercial and business terms is not something that has been decided now. The die was cast for that 45 years ago.

With that, that's my report for this evening.

We will move into the Department
Reports and Administrator Andy Rose.

1	MR. ROSE: Thank you, Mr. McIntosh,
2	members of the Board, citizen Teknipp, members
3	of the audience, good evening. Welcome back
4	evervone.

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Just one quick item on the agenda I would like to cover, which is Item C. This is a Resolution that establishes regulations related to EV charging stations within the Township. We know they are coming. just want to point out this Resolution is the product of some really good work and coordination between the Zoning and the Fire Department, working together as a great team, coming up with these regulations to manage the EV charging stations, to make sure that they are in an appropriate place and that they are safe. I would encourage passage on Item C, which is that resolution.

This Fall, Concord Township, we're going to be doing some restoration work on six of our oldest cemetery monuments.

The monuments are going to be disassembled, because we have to repair the foundations. There is also going to be some repair work done to the headstones. There are

six of them. Five of them date back to the mid 1800s. 1850s to be exact. They were the six that were determined to be in the worst shape. We wanted to let folks know, because as a lot of people visit our cemeteries, we're not tearing down monuments. We are actually repairing monuments to prolong their life and maintain the beauty of our cemetery and to show respect for all that are interred there.

The Service Director and I took a little field trip today and reviewed the roof at Old Stone School earlier today. We believe it's time for a replacement. It's very tired. So Mr. Brown is going to be obtaining some new quotes. We do have the funds available to replace the roof in our repair and maintenance account, so that will be fine.

Finally, one other item, the water line project continues to move along. The 70 percent plans were recently submitted by the design team to both Painesville Water and the Lake County Engineer for their initial

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Then once this review is complete, they 2 3 send their feedback back to our design engineers. They will finalize the plans. Then they will go back to Painesville Water 5 6 and Lake County Engineers respectively, for another look, just to make sure all the 7 8 coordination is done. And we expect this 9 project will be ready to go out for bid in the 10 late Fall. Probably mid to late November.

That concludes my report. I'd be happy to answer any questions. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thank you,

Mr. Rose. If that goes to bid in the Fall,

what are we looking at, is that kind of a see

what kind of Winter we have, is it a

Springtime thing?

MR. ROSE: According to the -actually it's Painesville Water, doing it over
the Winter when the ground is frozen is a
great time to dig and install that stuff
because there is a lot less mud. It's good
Winter work for excavating companies. So I
would expect that that will get done over the
Winter.

1	CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Okay.
2	Fire Department, Chief Sabo.
3	CHIEF SABO: Good evening
4	everyone. So for the month of August we had a
5	total of 310 runs, including 200 EMS events,
6	with 154 transports. We had 110 non-EMS
7	events, including three fires, one dumpster
8	fire inside Concord. Outside of Concord we
9	assisted with one residential fire and one
10	commercial fire.
11	We gave mutual aid 16 times, and
12	received mutual aid 13 times. We had 100
13	overlapping calls for about 32 percent. So it
14	was a busy month.
15	Fire Prevention Bureau completed 74
16	inspections, accounting for about 112 hours.
17	10 planned reviews, accounting for about 27
18	hours.
19	On August 30th we were happy to be
20	invited to the Senior Appreciation Event at
21	the Concord Community Center. We provided
22	information on fire safety. We provided blood
23	pressure checks. We talked about, with our
24	residents, about 911 alerting systems and

residential lock boxes to approximately 135

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guests. It was a good event and a nice

outreach. Again, kudos to the Recreation

Department, Sean and his team for hitting

another one out of the park there. They just

keep coming.

We did install two residential lock boxes. We had none returned.

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Just as a reminder, our aluminum can collection is continuing. But the bin has been relocated. Since Community Day we had to relocate it anyway, so we thought what better time than now to relocate it to the new fire station. So it's in its permanent home at the new fire station parking lot at the south end of the building. Actually east end of the building. So, we still, we continue to thank you for your ongoing support and recycling proceeds continue to support our fire prevention and education program. That goes a long way.

Just in terms of the agenda items,

Item D on the agenda is a Resolution

authorizing the distribution of grant funding

from the Ohio Ambulance Transportation

Program. This is pass through funding that

1 we've been talking about for quite a while.

We applied along with many, many other fire

departments. Is pass through fund from the

4 government, to give back to the front line

5 workers that worked through COVID. So, this

Resolution is a requirement of that process in

7 order for us to distribute the funds to the

8 firefighters that were involved in that, that

9 are on our rolls today. We appreciate your

10 support for that.

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Just as a reminder, September is
national preparedness month, which serves as a
reminder that disasters and emergencies can
strike at any moment like we just saw recently
with the storms that everyone was talking
about.

This year's theme is Take Control in 1, 2, 3. Step 1 is assess your needs. Step 2, make a plan. Step 3, engage your support network. I urge you to visit FEMA's website at ready.gov for resources to assist you in formulating a preparedness plan.

I took the opportunity as I was heading home a couple days after that storm, and utility companies were all staged on Crile

Road, in Gristmill Plaza and Crile Crossings and Drug Mart Plaza. I had to go to Drug Mart anyway, but I stopped in and took a moment to just thank the utility workers.

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The crew I was talking to was from Cincinnati. As Trustee Dondorfer was saying there was a crew from Jersey that actually helped our Administrative Assistant, part of the tornado went through her property, caused some extensive damage there. She got to chat up with the Jersey Boys as she called them.

So, when you see these utility companies, these fellows and gals are out away from their families for an extended period of time as they get deployed across the county to help restore power. It's not an easy process. They are working in extreme conditions as well. That is their job, that is what they signed up for, just like us, but you know, it just says a lot when people drop what they need to, to go help somebody else. Whether it's their job or not. We appreciate it. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN McINTOSH: Thank you, Chief.

25 Service Department, Tim Brown.

1	MR. BROWN: Good evening
2	everyone. In the month of August the Service
3	Department responded to two downed trees
4	blocking the roadways during the most recent
5	storms.
6	Our crack sealing crew completed the
7	crack sealing of many Township roadways.
8	Our concrete crew and continues to
9	perform slab replacement to the Township
10	concrete roadways. As of today and crew's
11	poured approximately 420 yards of concrete
12	this season.
13	Our asphalt crew continues to
14	DuraPatch continues with the DuraPatch
15	repairs to our asphalt roadways.
16	Additionally, the department has been
17	working closely with the Lake County Storm
18	Water Department on some upcoming storm water
19	projects to reduce erosion and enhance flow of
20	storm water through the Township.
21	The Service Department reopened the
22	yard waste drop off at the Service Department
23	on September 5th. The drop off is open Monday
24	through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.
25	Residents may drop off yard waste in paper

biodegradable bags in the designated material
bin.

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The annual Fall brush collection is scheduled for Saturdays October 14th and October 21st, from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Residents may drop off brush 4 inches in diameter and smaller. No stumps, landscape timbers, railroad ties, or lumber is permitted. Yard waste will also be accepted on these dates as well.

As the Winter season approaches, we remind residents about the mailbox snow barricade available through the Service Department. Residents that wish to purchase a snow barricade can kind the application located on the Township website under forms and applications, or at the Town Hall. The cost is \$50 and it includes installation by the Service Department. There a \$15 reinstall and removal fee for those who wish to have the barricade reinstalled or removed.

The Service Department's new storage building construction is moving along. ACM poured the footers the week of 8-21. The structural steel was delivered on 8-5. I'm

2	steel. ACM plans to have the framework
3	installed by the end of this week. We're
4	anxious to get our equipment into the
5	building, protect it from the elements, and
6	prolong its life.

15	During the month of July the Zoning Department
16	permit staff processed 43 zoning permit
17	applications, and collected approximately
18	\$7,500 in fees.
19	Additionally we were busy out in the
20	community performing inspections, including 96
21	property inspections and issued 27 zoning
22	certificates and fines.
23	We also received and followed up on 20
24	new complaints about potential zoning
25	violations.

1	Next week the Board of Zoning Appeals
2	will have a meeting on Wednesday. There are
3	five variance applications. The detailed
4	agenda may be viewed on the Township website
5	under the public meetings tab.

Reminder also that buses do have

cameras on them. We get sent all of the

violations, we do cite all of the violations.

So be aware of that. Just because we might

not be around, you try to pass a school bus,

we're going to contact you, and you are going

to receive a ticket. So please, stop for the

school buses. It's unacceptable.

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We just put on three deputies; Kayla

Vandervort, Brook Daughters, and Chase

Elersich. Chase was actually was in Explorers

with the Sheriff's Office's Explorers Program.

He is a Riverside graduate. Now he's a

full-fledged Deputy on road patrol.

Speaking of the Explorers Program, we received two grants; one for \$12,000 and another for \$6,000. So we are sitting pretty good for that. Continuing, trying to recruit new future deputies just like Chase. Some other Explorers have gone into corrections and dispatch actually too. In the future they will be deputies when they are old enough.

Deputy Paylo is now on solo patrol. He was our last deputy to be on field training, and now obviously he passed his training, and

he's on solo patrol, so he's out there.

The speed trailers have been out. I've had them on Prouty Road, Girdled Road,

Cascade, Morely, 84, and I will be putting it in the future on Mountain Park here coming up soon, Allegheny.

The dive team has been going through a week of training this week. They are working hard to refine their skills. They have been in Westlake with that training. We just posted it on our Facebook page, if you want to see some of the pictures of that training.

We have two new bike patrol operators,

Deputy Gaylog and Deputy Tekavic. They just

went with an intense week-long training for

that. They have a lot of bruises from it. We

are excited to have our bike unit.
