CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION FOR FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES

Please take time to review the Citizens Advisory Committee recommendation that can be found on our website in the Government section. This committee presented a well researched and thought out proposal for a 5-year 3.9 mil Fire Levy to address critical funding needs for fire and emergency medical services (EMS) in Concord Township. The proposed levy will free up existing safety levy funds to restore 24/7 police patrols with two deputies. Acknowledging economic challenges, the committee emphasizes the necessity of this levy to maintain service standards and enhance safety. We will continue transparent communication with the community about additional information about the levy recommendation.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

We look forward to new businesses that will be opening soon: Little Mountain Creamery, Johnny's Auto Spa + Detail, and Taco Bell are expected to open or start construction soon in the business district near Capital Parkway.

CONCORD TOWNSHIP FIRE DEPARTMENT: A Comprehensive Overview of Our Services

This November, Concord Township will place a 3.9 mill Fire Department Operational Levy on the ballot. Asking for additional funding is challenging, but it is essential to continue providing the emergency services and programs our community relies on. This levy will also enable the full restoration of policing services by the Lake County Sheriff's Office. We encourage you to reach out to Deputy Chief Biddell, Administrator Rose (440-354-7513), or a Township Trustee for more information on our needs and how this funding will protect our services in the years to come.

Many residents may not be fully aware of the extensive range of services we provide, particularly in emergencies. This overview aims to highlight the fantastic services your Concord Township Fire Department offers.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS)

Although named the Concord Township Fire Department, approximately 85% of our call volume involves high-quality, pre-hospital, paramedic-level emergency medical care. Our EMS staff is highly skilled and trained to function as an extension of the emergency department physician.

We understand that calling 911 usually means you are experiencing one of the worst days of your life. Our paramedics are dedicated to delivering exceptional patient care while respecting your preference to stay within your chosen hospital system. After a thorough examination, we will strive to honor your request. However, there are certain limitations regarding hospital acceptance. For instance, if you are likely experiencing a heart attack, stroke, or trauma, we must transport you to specific hospitals equipped to treat those conditions.

FIREFIGHTING SERVICES

In addition to EMS, we are indeed a fire department. Our fleet includes:

- 2 frontline and 1 reserve structural fire engines (pumpers)
- 1 heavy rescue fire engine
- 1 off-road ATV for wildland firefighting and patient rescues in inaccessible areas like the Metroparks

We respond to various calls, including odor investigations, carbon monoxide incidents, and vehicle crashes. Our firefighters are trained in multiple rescue and emergency disciplines, such as hazardous materials and technical rope rescue. Additionally, three of our firefighter/paramedics serve as tactical paramedics with the Lake County SWAT Team and Lake County Bomb Squad, providing medical services during their operations.

FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU

The Concord Township Fire Department is committed to serving not just as firefighters but as integral community members. Our fire prevention and education bureau emphasizes fostering strong connections with the people we serve. We believe that involvement in community events extends beyond responding to emergencies. By fostering meaningful connections with residents, promoting fire safety education, and supporting local causes, we strive to create a safer, stronger, and more resilient community. We are committed to expanding our community engagement efforts and making a positive impact on the lives of those we serve.

COMMUNITY EVENTS PARTICIPATION

- **Public Safety Demonstrations:** We regularly conduct public safety demonstrations at community events and local businesses, educating attendees on fire prevention techniques, emergency preparedness, and basic first aid and CPR. These interactive sessions empower members of our community to take proactive measures to enhance their safety and well-being.
- **Community Events:** Throughout the year, we participate in various community events. Our bureau actively plans large events within the Township to help foster a safe and successful environment. During events, our staff distributes fire safety materials and organizes fun activities for children, contributing to the festive atmosphere while promoting important safety messages.
- **School Visits:** Engaging with the younger members of our community is paramount to building a culture of safety from an early age. We regularly visit local schools to deliver fire safety presentations, conduct drills, and build positive relationships with students, teachers, school resource officers, and parents.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROGRAMS

- **Smoke Alarm Installation Program:** We run a smoke alarm installation program to ensure every home in our community is equipped with functioning smoke detectors. Through partnerships with local organizations and businesses, we provide free smoke alarms and installation services, improving overall fire safety.
- **Community CPR Training:** Recognizing the importance of bystander intervention in medical emergencies, we offer community CPR training courses taught by

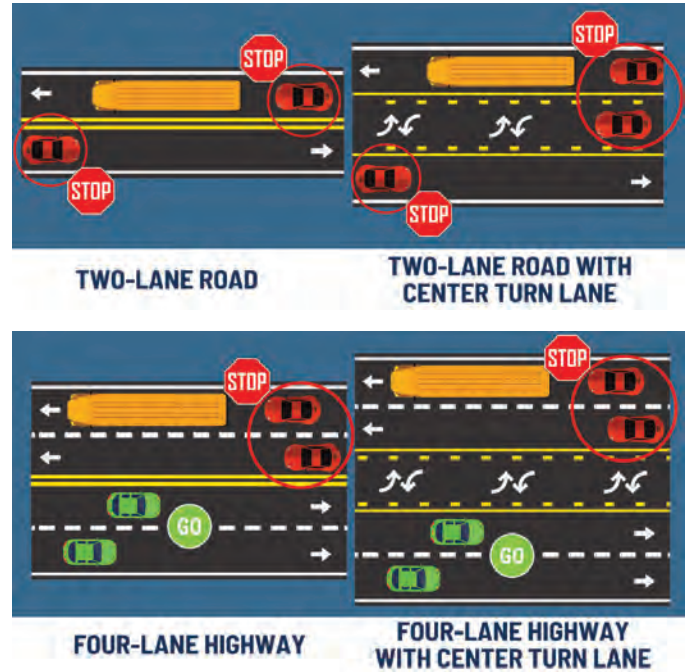

certified instructors. By educating residents with life-saving skills, we aim to increase the likelihood of positive outcomes in emergency situations.

- **Red Cross Babysitting Program:** Started in 2023, this program aims to better prepare babysitters in our community who care for our children. The course covers basic childcare, first aid, bottle feeding, safety in the home, child behavior, leadership, starting a babysitting business, and more.
- **Stop the Bleed Program:** The number one cause of preventable death after injury is bleeding. We collaborate with other agencies, schools, and businesses to expand the reach of this program, educating individuals on handling emergency situations and stopping life-threatening bleeding.
- **Child Safety Seat Installation:** We are proud to be one of the few agencies in Lake County with certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians on staff. Our technicians promote child passenger safety and reduce the risk of injury to children in our community. Residents can schedule an appointment for assistance with safety seat installation and guidance.

We remain committed to making Concord Township a safe and enjoyable place to live, work, and play. As we enter

another school year, please remember to observe the speed limits in school zones and heed the signals on school buses.

The Service Department has been very busy throughout the Township this past spring and summer, providing the best service possible to the residents of Concord Township. Our crews perform many road maintenance operations, such as concrete slab replacement, curb inlet repair and replacement, crack sealing, Dura-Patch asphalt repairs, partial and full depth asphalt repairs, ditch maintenance, and grounds maintenance to Township-owned properties and parks.

Some notable projects that took place this summer was the installation of a new metal roof and siding for the Red Barn located between Fire Station 1 and the Service Department Storage Building. This project was funded by NOPEC grant funds. The Community Center received a new concrete sidewalk to access the new patio. This project was performed by the Service Department's concrete crew. This year, the 2024 Joint Road Resurfacing Project included Viewmont Drive, Page Drive and Winchell Road. Viewmount Drive and Page Drive received asphalt resurfacing while Winchell Road received three culvert replacements, asphalt with a chip seal and fog coat resurfacing. Additional work performed under the joint resurfacing project was the application of Reclamite, an asphalt rejuvenator. This application was done to 10 Concord Township roadways that were paved in the last 3 years. This application reactivates the maltenes in the asphalt and helps prolong the flexibility and life of the asphalt, adding years of service life to the roadway. Discovery Lane received 500' of concrete road replacement and was paved using TIF (Tax Increment Financing) funds. These funds are exclusive to the Capital Parkway and Discovery Lane corridor. Our Concrete Slab replacement program performed work in the Hunt Club subdivision, Concord Hills subdivision, Kellogg Park Estates, and several other areas throughout the Township.

Working with the Lake County Stormwater Department we can utilize storm water funds to make many stormwater improvements and enhancements within the Township. A stormwater improvement project on Grandridge Pointe Dr. repairing a failed stormwater outlet and erosion issue was done. The maintenance of detention ponds under the Township's maintenance responsibility and planning for other future projects. In addition to stormwater projects, the Stormwater Department helps provide technical support to residents with drainage issues or concerns on private property.

In the coming months, the Service Department will wrap up our construction season and prepare for our fall and winter operations. Crews will continue with road maintenance as the weather allows. As we approach the fall season, the Service Department will begin to prepare equipment for winter operations. Prepping the snow fighting equipment by installing the salt spreaders and plows, ensuring everything is operating

properly and ready to go when the snow or ice hits. October 15th is the date we set every year to have our front-line plow trucks ready to go. This ensures when the first signs of winter show up, the Service Department can respond to whatever Mother Nature throws at us. In addition to preparing for the winter season, our crews will begin evaluating roadways within the Township for the 2025 construction season. Road conditions are evaluated and prioritized for repairs and resurfacing. The Service Department provides many services to the residents, as listed below.

YARD WASTE

Residents of Concord Township can dump their yard waste in the material bin located at the Service Department Monday through Friday from 7:30 am-2:30 pm during the Yard Waste drop-off months of operation. The Yard Waste drop-off will reopen for the 2024 fall season on September 3rd and run through December 6th. The Service Department reminds Concord residents that only yard waste in biodegradable paper bags is permitted. Yard waste such as leaves, weeds, small twigs, and grass clippings are permitted.

BRUSH DAYS DROP-OFF

The Service Department will offer the annual Brush Day Drop-Off on two days in October. Saturday, October 5th, and Saturday, October 19th, are the dates set for the fall of 2024. The drop-off hours of operation will be 7:30 am-2:30 pm on both days at the Service Department. Residents are reminded that only brush is permitted at the drop-off. No landscape timbers, railroad ties, tree stumps, or lumber are permitted. Tree limbs no larger than four inches in diameter. Residents may also bring their yard waste on these days.

CULVERT REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

Residents who wish to have their driveway culvert replaced can contact the Service Department for information on replacing their culvert pipe. A culvert replacement application form is available at Town Hall, The Service Department, or on the Concord Township Website under forms and applications. A \$200.00 fee for this service includes the stone it takes to back-fill the area. The resident is responsible for purchasing the replacement pipe the Service Department recommends before being scheduled. The property owner is also responsible for replacing asphalt or concrete removed during the replacement.

MAILBOX SNOW BARRICADES

The Service Department reminds residents of the Mailbox Snow Barricades as we approach the winter season. The Service Department provides the labor to install the barricades for residents of Concord Township at no charge. The barricade includes two steel posts, an aluminum board, reflective

numbers, and hardware. The materials must be purchased from Concord Township for \$50.00. The barricades absorb the impact of heavy snow being discharged by the snowplows. Please keep in mind that the barricade does not guarantee that your mailbox will not be damaged during the winter season. Residents who wish to purchase a snow barricade may do so by filling out the Snow Barricade Application and sending the \$50.00 payment. Applications can be found on the Concord Township Website or at Town Hall. Once payment is received, your barricade installation will be scheduled. This will be a one-time installation, and all maintenance thereafter will be the resident's responsibility. There is a \$15 fee for the removal and reinstallation of the barricade if the resident wishes to have that service provided.

HOW TO LOCATE YOUR PROPERTY MARKERS

Property markers (pins) are metal pins placed at every corner of the property, including any angle or change of direction of the boundary line. Each pin is shown on the survey of each property. Property owners are responsible for knowing where their property lines are when applying for permits for projects such as installing fences, building additions, and sheds. Property pin location is important information to avoid legal and neighborhood disputes. Property lines or boundary lines are the defined points where one person's land ends and the neighboring land begins.

1. To ensure you can dig for your property markers safely, call OHIO811 System at 8-1-1, or submit a request on the website www.oups.org/edig to locate utility lines. They will need a 48 hour notice. This is a free service.
2. Obtain a copy of a survey of your property, an aerial view printout of your lot showing lot dimensions or obtain a copy of a plat drawing. We also recommend checking your address file at Concord Township Zoning Department for an existing survey or other site plan that would be helpful in your search for survey pins.

- Click on the Plat Maps button.
- Enter the name of the Plat (subdivision) or partial name.
- Enter "Concord Township".
- Click on the Search for Plat button.

For site plans visit Lake County Engineer:

<https://gis.lakecountyoohio.gov/SitePlansApp/>

- Choose Jurisdiction "Concord Township".
 - Enter the house number.
 - Enter the street name (without the suffix)
 - Click the search button.
3. Gather materials you will need to locate your property markers: survey (lot dimensions), tape measure, shovel, and/or a metal detector can be used if you are having difficulty finding your pins.
 4. Survey pins are typically 18 feet in from the curb. Go to your front curb and measure back about 18 feet in the area you think your marker should be. Use a metal detector and then start digging. The marker should be about 6-10 inches below the surface. Newer survey pins may have a colored cap with numbers on the top. Older survey pins will often be a hollow or solid metal pin.



If you are having difficulty locating your front curb to begin measuring, use the county plat drawing to determine with width of the public right of way in front of your property. If you live in a subdivision, the public right of way is typically 60 feet in width. Assume the road is centered in the right of way (not always the case). Measure from the center of the road (cautiously) towards your property, $\frac{1}{2}$ the right of way width. Make this measurement multiple times along the front of your parcel, placing a marker each time. The markers defined by your measurements should roughly create your front-lot line location. This will help you begin to find your property pins.

5. Once you have located the first pin, use your survey or plat map to check the distance to the next stake. Using your tape measure, measure the distance from the first pin, then use the metal detector and dig. Continue doing this until all pins are found.
6. Once survey pins are found, place a stake or marker of some type adjacent to the survey pin. Pull a string between the stakes to help define the property line. Never remove your property pins.
7. If you are unable to find your pins, contact a licensed Professional Land Surveyor. You can search Google or the phone directory "Yellow Pages" for local area land surveying firms.

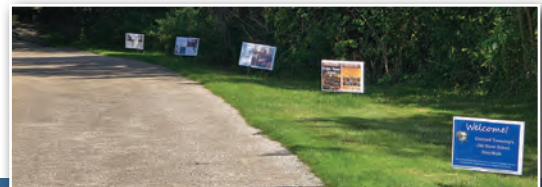
